

REGISTRATION ARRANGEMENTS NOT COMPLETE

SHERIFF HAWTHORNE AWAITS INSTRUCTIONS

Places Selected in Fredericton, Marysville and Devon—Will Visit North Lake Tomorrow

Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne of this city who has been appointed officer in charge of the registration of all persons above the age of sixteen, ordered by the Federal government, has not yet been notified when the registration is to take place. June 22nd has been mentioned as a possible date but there is no confirmation. Sheriff Hawthorne has been furnished with a copy of the law governing the registration but is waiting for further instructions before taking action throughout the electoral district of York-Sunbury. He estimates that he must make three trips to all registration places in the constituency before his work will be complete.

Places of Registration.

He has selected the following places of registration: City of Fredericton, Hart Shoe Factory, C.P.R. Station, County Court House, City Hall, Charlotte Street School, Victoria Mill, Experimental Farm; New Maryland parish, Nasonworth; Devon, the two hose stations; Marysville, cotton mill, police station, one to be selected on other side of Nashwaak River.

Sheriff Hawthorne intends to visit North Lake parish tomorrow to make necessary arrangements. He will visit other sections later.

Minister of Public Works Here.

Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works for New Brunswick, arrived here last night and is attending to a large amount of departmental business. He will be here for several days.

Johnston of McAdam, also arrived at Halifax.

TRAGIC DEATH OF DEVON GIRL IN BOSTON

MISS NELLIE LIPSETT DIES BY HER OWN HAND

Motive of Deed Unknown—Body will be Brought Here—Young Woman Well Known Here.

A telegram from Boston to Rev. A. D. McLeod, pastor of Devon Methodist church, early this morning contained the news that Miss Nellie Lipsett, formerly of South Devon, had died suddenly at Boston yesterday and that the body would be brought here tomorrow for service with interment at Pleasant Valley, Nashwaak, the former home of the family of the deceased. It was thought on the receipt of the message that death had been due to accident as a letter had been received from the deceased by her mother Saturday and she was in perfect health. Press dispatches later in the morning contained the word that the young woman had died by her own hand.

Surviving Family.

The deceased is survived by her mother, Mrs. Lavinia Lipsett, widow of James Lipsett, residing in Devon, also by five sisters, Mrs. Angus McLaggan of Nashwaak Bridge, Miss May Lipsett of New York, Miss Ruth Lipsett of Boston, Mrs. Fred McLellan of Marysville, who went about six weeks ago to Boston where she now is, and Miss Allie Lipsett at home in Devon.

Funeral Service.

The funeral service will be held at the late home of the deceased in Devon at eight o'clock Wednesday night, being conducted by Rev. Mr. McLeod. The body will be taken on Thursday morning by C. G. R. to Pleasant Valley, Nashwaak, where interment will be made. Miss Ruth Lipsett will accompany the body from Boston.

The deceased had been residing in Boston for about two years but frequently visited her home at Devon. The last visit was during the winter. She was well known in Fredericton and vicinity and was a young woman of attractive appearance.

Some years ago she was an operator at the local telephone exchange and also was a clerk in stores in this city.

Account of Tragedy.

The story of the tragic occurrence as it is given by the Associated Press is as follows:

Boston, May 21. — With one hand holding a telephone receiver and the other clutching a 32 calibre revolver, Miss Nellie Lipsett, aged 19, was found dead in bed last night from a bullet wound in her head. Miss Lipsett's sister, Ruth, made the discovery when she returned from work. The young women lived together in an apartment in the Allston district.

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UNFAVORABLE SEASON FOR FOREST FIRES

LITTLE DAMAGE YET BY FIRES IN THE WOODS

Hon. E. A. Smith Fought Fire in Person Saturday—Voting of Limit Holders Not Completed.

Hon. E. A. Smith of Shediac, Minister of Lands and Mines, arrived here last night, and today is devoting his attention to departmental business. When interviewed this morning with regard to forest fires in New Brunswick the minister stated that few fires had yet been reported to the Department of Lands and Mines and that none that had occurred had assumed serious proportions. On Saturday last Hon. Mr. Smith was out in person with a crew of men fighting fire in Westmorland county. Small fires in Kent county were reported to him and he authorized the warden to employ men.

Organization Not Yet Completed.

The fire fighting organization under the new legislation is not yet completed but is awaiting the appointment of the commission which will administer the Crown Lands. The voting by the holders of timber limits on the appointment of one member to the commission is not yet completed. From two-thirds to three-quarters of the vote has been cast and it is understood that the vote is close.

Unfavorable to Fires.

The present spring has been most unfavorable to forest fires. The rain fell at opportune times and the foliage came out green at a time when fires are likely to occur. The northern portion of the province has been particularly free from forest fires.

Planting Well Advanced.

Planting is well advanced in Westmorland, Albert and Kent counties, according to Hon. E. A. Smith, who is in the city today. In the three counties \$40,000 worth of seed has been purchased by the farmers through the municipalities. Last year seed to the value of only \$7,000 was so bought. All through the spring is one of the most favorable to farming operations ever experienced in the province.

Hon. E. A. Smith of Shediac, Minister of Lands and Mines, is registered at the Queen.

Telephone records show that a call from the Lipsett apartment came in several hours before Miss Lipsett's body was found. The name of the person whom she called is sought by the police in their efforts to find a motive for the girl's death. The police and the medical examiner said they were convinced that Miss Lipsett committed suicide but that they were in the dark as to the cause. The Lipsett sisters came here several weeks ago from Fredericton, N. B., where the mother lives.
