

## PUBLIC MEETING TO BE HELD RE WAR MEMORIAL

MAYOR HANSON WILL  
CALL THE MEETING

City Council Passed Resolution  
Approving of the Action of  
Society of St. Andrew  
in Matter.

A public meeting is to be called by His Worship Mayor Hanson for the purpose of considering the form to be taken by the Great War Memorial to be erected in Fredericton. The City Council in special session last night took up the matter and discussed it at some length.

On the motion of Ald. Walker seconded by Ald. Cooper the following resolution was unanimously passed:

Whereas this council has had under consideration the resolution passed by the Fredericton Society of St. Andrew on the 30th day of November last respecting the erection of a permanent memorial in honour of the memory of the heroic men of Fredericton who have laid down their lives in the Great War now ended,

Therefore, resolved that this council cordially endorses the said proposal and that the Mayor be authorized to call a public meeting of the citizens to decide the question, and if favorable to decide the form of such memorial and arrange for the erection of same by public subscription.

The deceased is survived by her parents and several brothers and sisters. The funeral took place this afternoon from the late home, interment being made at Swaney bank Cemetery.

## ANTIMONY MINE MAY BE OPERATED BY NEXT SPRING

NEW YORK, IN CITY NOW

Option from Can. Antimony  
Co., Held for Two Years  
—May Manufacture  
at Mine.

There is a prospect of one of the industries of York County being revived in the not far distant future. The industry in question is the Lake George Antimony Mine now owned by the Canadian Antimony Company Limited and on which an American syndicate has held an option for some two years. With the close of the war and increased facilities for financing it is probable that the mines will again be worked and that the metal which formerly was shipped as ore or in a refined state will be made into products at Lake George.

### Mr. Dixon in the City

Mr. Walter F. Dixon of New York who is registered at the Barker House represents the syndicate which holds the option from the Canadian Antimony Company Limited. Mr. Dixon while here today met a number of the directors of that company. He will go on to Albert County to spend Christmas with his relatives.

### To Operate in the Spring

When interviewed by a reporter of the Daily Mail Mr. Dixon said that there were good prospects of the mine being taken over in the spring and worked by the new owners. The cessation of hostilities had removed some of the handicaps under which the holders of the option had labored.

### Left for Home

Major Morris Scovil left for Gagetown this morning. Major Scovil has had a very eventful military career and received a stirring welcome at the hands of the people of Gagetown. He was a prisoner in Germany for some time.

### Commissioned as Captain

Mr. Roland H. Hartley of Everett, Wash., who with his brother Mr. Frank Hartley of the same city, spent some time here in the autumn, recently was commissioned as captain in the 20th Engineers, United States Army. He had been in hope of seeing service overseas but it is not likely now that he will. This is not Capt. Hartley's first experience in military life as he was a colonel of the Minnesota State National Guard during the Spanish war. His eldest son Edward is in France an officer in the 151st Field Artillery of the American Army and expects to remain for some time with the army of occupation. Another son David is at Camp Taylor, Kentucky, qualifying as a flier. Capt. Hartley has many friends and relatives in the province and himself is a native of Meductic.

## BELT LINE OF PAVED STREETS IS SUGGESTED

PROF. STILES BEFORE  
THE CITY COUNCIL

Advocates Tar-Macadam for  
Charlotte Street—His Sug-  
gestions Well Received  
by Council.

The City Council now is considering a scheme of permanent pavement for Fredericton which will primarily provide for a belt-line of paved streets of which the tarvia and concrete pavement of Queen Street repaired and a tar-macadam pavement the entire length of Charlotte Street will be the chief sections. Tar-macadam connections via Smythe Street and University Avenue also are in contemplation. The scheme is the first-year portion of a general scheme covering several years in which it is hoped that the streets in this city will be placed in proper condition.

The cost of the first year's work is estimated roughly at \$35,000 but without curb and gutter on Charlotte and other streets which would be required to be paved. The proposal is to meet the expenditure out of revenue instead of putting out a bond issue. If the scheme is put into effect next year it will mean an increase in the total assessment even with the Patriotic Fund item removed. This might mean an increase in the rate or in the valuation. Some members of the City Council are of the belief that a survey of the city for purposes of revaluation would reveal so much property unassessed and so much underassessed that there would be no necessity of increasing the rate of assessment.

Another important suggestion is that the matter of permanent pavement be placed under a permanent commission which would exercise supervision of the operation through a competent engineer. The latter item leads up to the necessity at a date not far in the future for Fredericton to have a permanent city engineer.

The matter was before the City Council in committee last night when Prof. Stiles of the University of New Brunswick gave the council a number of suggestions. The Council will further consider the subject.

### Prof. Stiles' Suggestions

Prof. Stiles spoke at some length and gave several very helpful suggestions. Fredericton must avoid plunging, he said, and it must be remembered that the country was on the eve of great development in highway and street construction. He advised a general survey of all the streets of the city and would advise the engagement of an engineer of experience. He

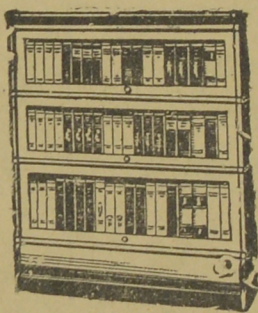

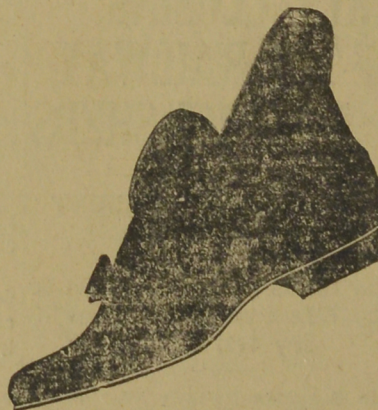
