Premier's Crushing Reply To Opposition Criticism

Hon. Mr Foster Deals in an Able and Businesslike Way With Provincial Affairs--Dealt Effectively With Leader Murray's Criticism and Carried the War Into Africa---Old Government's Sins of Commission and Omission Dealt With--Government Supporters United and Enthusiastic.

The debate on the address was continued in the Legislature yesterday afternoon by Mr. J. A. Murray, leader of the opposition who spoke for little more than half an hour. He paid a tribute to the late Governor Ganong and also made a pleasing reference to the elevation of Hon. J. D. Hazen to the office of Chief Justice. The opposition leader also paid a tribute to the late Joseph Howe Dickson, clerk of the executive council, and to the late Mr. John F. Payne, caretaker of the parliament building, and referred to the retirement of Mr. G. Hudson Flewelling and James Lynn after

many years of public service. In referring to the new highway act the opposition leader indulged in considerable criticism and claimed that money had been squandered on the roads of the province last season. He also twitted the government in regard to its crown land policy, particularly in regard to the recent increase of stumpage. He said he was not opposed to the punishment of wrong doing in connection with the Valley railway but he thought any legislation on the subject should take in the Central and other railways constructed in recent years. He criticised the recent bond issue of one million dollars and claimed that the province had made a loss on the same of \$30,000, by not selling the issue at public tender. Mr. Murray promised that his party would heartily support all government measures designed for the good of the province but would reserve the right to criticise such measures as they deemed not to be in the public interest.

Premier Foster followed the opposition leader and after speaking for little less than an hour, moved the adjournment of the debate which was made the order of the day for Monday.

Premier Foster's Reply.
HON. MR. FOSTER when he rose to continue the debate on the address, congratulated the mover and secondor upon the manner in which they had acquitted themselves and upon the credit they had brought upon them-

selves and their constituents. It was a pleasure to him to have associated in his party men of the standing of those who had spoken--men who were present at great inconvenience, and who were in the House not for any financial gain, but because of their desire to do their part toward advancing the interests of their province.

In a Safe Place.
Hon. Mr. Foster also congratulated the leader of the opposition, but said that his congratulations extended more particularly to his style and flow of oratory, and the smoothness of his words, of which there were plenty. From his speech it would be judged that the hon. leader of the opposition never had occupied a seat in the government of the province, instead of being there for years, that he never had been prime minister, and therefore had had no opportunity to bring into effect the wonderful things which he had offered to the House in

Oats will be sold for \$1.32 per bushel, in bulk car lots, or \$1.38 in bags in car lots laid down.

Wheat will be sold for \$3.00 per bushel, in bags car lots or f. o. b., distributing point for smaller orders.

Local freights will be paid by purchaser. County Councillors and Agricultural Societies should place car lot orders immediately, stating destination for cars. Delivery not guaranteed unless orders placed within three weeks, because of transportation difficulties.
