

Murray, leader of the opposition who spoke for little more than half an hour. He paid a tribute to the late Governor Ganong and also made a pleasing reference to the elevation of Hon. J. D. Hazen to the office of Chief Justice. The opposition leader also paid a tribute to the late Joseph Howe Dickson, clerk of the executive council, and to the late Mr. John F. Payne, caretaker of the parliament building, and referred to the retirement of Mr. G. Hudson Flewelling and James Lynn after

many years of public service.

In referring to the new highway act the opposition leader indulged in considerable criticism and claimed that money had been squandered on the roads of the povince last season. He also twitted the government in regard t oits crown land policy, particularly in regard to the recent increase of stumpage. He said he was not opposed to the punishment of wrong doing in connection with the Valley railway but he thought any legislation on the subject should take in the Central and other railways constructed in recent years. He criticised the recent bond issue of one million dollars and claimed that the province had made a loss on the same of \$30,000, by not selling the issue at public tender.
