what he might be owing and what remained in the nature of liabilities unpaid. Heretofore the revenue of the province had consisted of moneys actually paid during the current year, without regard to the revenue accrued and unpaid, or which might possibly be paid in advance, and on the other side the expenditure consisted of the accounts which had been paid during the fiscal year, without any reference to the accounts outstanding and unpaid at that time.

In the statement it was found that the assets were divided into two classes. First, capital assets, which are fixed in their characters and do not

change very much from year to year. Second, current assets, such as bills receivable, accounts due the province, cash on hand. Upon summing these assets and liabilities and assembling them in a proper place such an accurate concise and complete statement of the assets of the province had never before been presented.

Provincial Liabilities.
Turning to liabilities it would be found: First, capital liabilities, which consist of bonds outstanding; Second, current liabilities, such as accounts payable, trust funds, interest accrued on securities; and such other items for which the province is liable. Legislative authority, authorizing the change of system from that prevailing in the accounting office of the province would be brought down and would bring into effect a system which would present a statement of simple, frank and straightforward character. This should eliminate much of the discussion which in past years had surrounded the presentation of the budget.

The Valley Railway.
HON. MR. FOSTER drew attention to the fact that there would be laid on the table of the House a complete statement of the expenditure upon the St. John & Quebec Railway from its commencement to the present time. To his mind, it was a remarkable fact that such a statement had not been presented before, when it was considered that the work was the most gigantic ever undertaken by the province. He also would inform the members that the first opportunity a statement with reference to the progress of construction work would be placed before the House.

The Ottawa Conference.
HON. MR. FOSTER, while on the discussion of this subject, stated also that a committee of the Government recently was afforded an opportunity of placing the whole railway situation as it unfortunately exists in New Brunswick before the Prime Minister of Canada. The matter of branch railways in this province, together with the situation with respect to the with the situation with respect to the St. John and Quebec Railway, had been placed before the Prime Minister. All were aware of the Federal Act for the acquisition of the Canadian Northern Railway, New Brunswick would bear her share of the financial burden involved, to the relief of other provinces. It therefore would be seen that it was necessary for everyone to use his influence that New Brunswick be recognized in whatever general railway policy might be evolved.

There was no denying the fact that the province was laboring under a tremendous financial strain caused partially by the construction of the St. John and Quebec Railway. The people could struggle under it, but it would necessitate the levying of additional taxation to pay the interest on the bonds, and unless relieved would retard development in other directions. Consideration should be given to the development of water powers and other natural resources, but while the railway matter was in this condition, the other matters must remain in abeyance. He was the last one who desired to place on the Government of Canada an unjust burden, but New Brunswick could be expected to pay only her just proportion. Relieved of a large interest burden, the Province could advance along lines of progress in other directions.

The Prohibition Act.
The Speech from the Throne had referred to the beneficial results of the Prohibition Act. That Act itself had been submitted to the late government

by the Dominion Alliance, but its success lay in its enforcement. Everyone would remember the predictions of the opposition, more especially those made by the present leader, who on nomination day at Hampton, among other rash statements, said that if the opposition party of that time were returned to power, it would be eighteen months before the people would enjoy the benefits of a prohibitory act.

He was as far astray in that statement as in those regarding the number of followers he would have in the House. One of the first acts of the present administration had been to provide the machinery for the enforcement of this law. He desired to take the opportunity of saying a word on behalf of the efficient Chief Inspector, who had performed his duties to the satisfaction of the government and with fairness to the public. However, with all his deputies, unless he had behind him the moral support of the government, he could not successfully carry out his duties. And he had that
