# **RESOURCES OF THE NATION ARE TO BE MOBILIZED**

**Registration of the Men and Women of  
Canada to be Carried Out on Saturday  
June 22nd -- Registrars Appointed for  
Every Federal Constituency -- Those  
Who Fail to Register Are Liable to a  
Heavy Penalty**

The Canada Registration Board has been created under the presidency of Honourable Senator G. B. Robertson for the purpose of carrying out the registration of the man and woman power of Canada, in order that the information so obtained may be utilized to proceed intelligently with the mobilization of the entire resources of the nation towards the successful pro-

secution of the war. Data of military value will be secured, but the main purpose to be served by this Census of all males and females in Canada over 16 years of age will undoubtedly be the better distribution of agricultural and industrial labour to the end of securing the maximum results for productive labour of the Canadian people—especially as regards the essentials of war. One of the most beneficial results which it is expected will follow, the Census will be a more efficient organization of the agricultural forces of the country, becoming daily more imperative in view of the constantly diminishing food reserves of the Entente Allies and the imminence of a food shortage which threatens our own civilian population.

# **Inside Story of War Conference**

Baron von Wagnheim, who when the war began was the German Ambassador at Constantinople, told the "inside story" of the Potsdam conference at which the Kaiser decided to wage war to Henry Morgenthau, United States Ambassador to Turkey. Baron von Wagnheim was present at the conference by the Kaiser's command. The story is told by Mr. Morgenthau in the June number of World's Work. He writes.

"The German Ambassador left for Berlin soon after the assassination of the Grand Duke, and he now revealed the cause of his sudden disappearance. The Kaiser, he told me, had summoned him to Berlin for an imperial conference. This meeting took place at Potsdam on July 5. The Kaiser presided; nearly all the ambassadors attended; Wagnheim came to tell of Turkey and enlighten his associates on the situation in Constantinople. Moltke, then Chief of Staff, was there representing the army, and Admiral von Tirpitz spoke for the navy. The great bankers, railroad directors and the captains of German industry, all of whom were as necessary to German war preparations as the army itself, also attended.

"Wagnheim now told me that he Kaiser solemnly put the question to each man in turn: Was he ready for war? All replied 'Yes' except the financiers. They said that they must have two weeks to sell their foreign securities and to make loans.

"In telling me about this conference Wagnheim, of course, admitted that Germany had precipitated the war. I think that he was rather proud of the whole performance; proud that Germany had gone about the matter in so methodical and farseeing a way; especially proud that he himself had been invited to participate in so momentous a gathering. The several blue, red and yellow books which flooded Europe the few months following the outbreak, and the hundreds of documents which were issued by German propaganda attempting to establish Germany's innocence, never made any impression on me. For my conclusions as to the responsibility are not based on suspicions or belief or the study of circumstantial data. I do not have to reason or argue about the matter. I know.

"This imperial conference took place July 5; the Serbian ultimatum was sent on July 22. That is just about the two weeks interval which the financiers had demanded to complete their plans. All the great stock exchanges of the world show that the German bankers profitably used this interval.

# **EVIDENCE OF DESPERATION OF GERMANY**

London, June 4.—In the recent acts of Germany there is evidence of a desperation which might allow increased confidence in the final outcome, declared Sir R. B. Finlay, Lord High Chancellor, in addressing a war savings meeting Monday. The spirit in which a nation faced difficulties was the thing that really counted.

The Lord Chancellor continued: "What means this bombing of hospitals, this murdering of nurses and medical men and their patients? It means the senseless rage of those who are maddened at the obstacle which England has thrown in the way of Germany, as it ever has thrown obstacles in the way of any power that aspired to the dominion of Europe and the world.

"The conduct of our enemy at this time recalls what was said of another personage. 'His effort is great because he knoweth that his time is short. Our enemies is indeed short. It will not be long before America has redressed the abance and enabled us to mete justice to Germany. 'As to the treatment of prisoners by Germany nothing more infamous could be conceived."

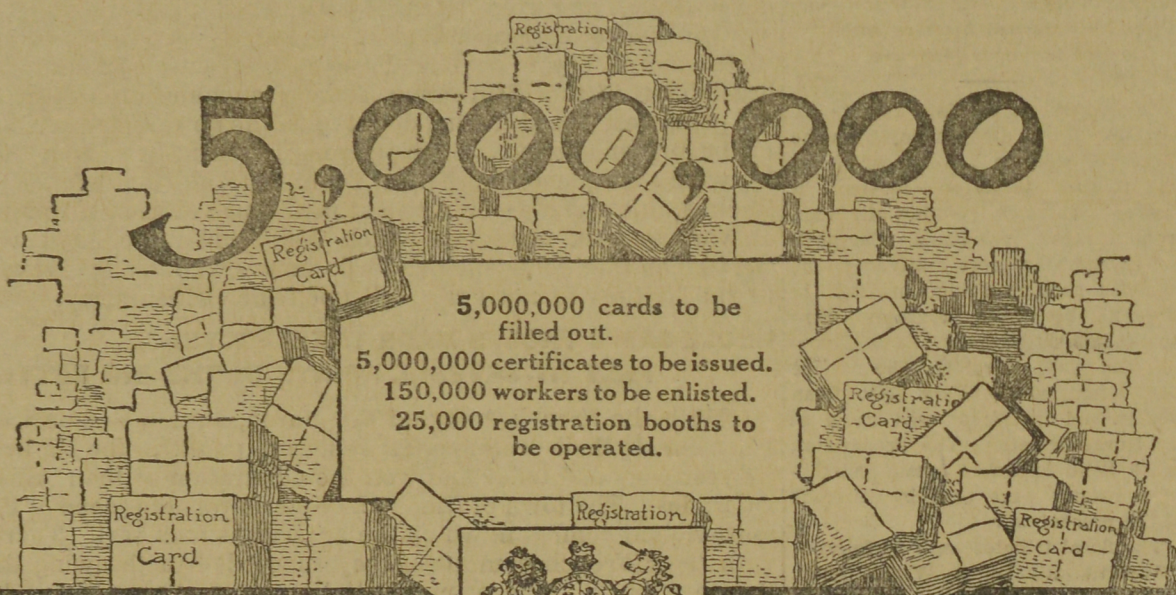

# **Registration a Stupendous Task One Day - SATURDAY - June 22nd**

The task undertaken by Canada to register every male and female, British or alien, of 16 years and over, residing in the Dominion, is of stupendous proportions. The machinery that has been created is most comprehensive in its scope, and the information procured through this registration will be in such form as to make it possible for Canada to mobilize every available unit of human energy, either in the "First line of defence" or at home in support of her Allies.

Five million people will have to be registered in one day. It is estimated that one hundred and fifty thousand workers will be required to take this registration, or an army five times the size of the first Canadian contingent.

It will require at least six minutes to register one person. A Deputy working continuously can take only ten registrations per hour, or eighty for an eight hour day. On Registration Day the booths will be open fifteen hours; the Deputies therefore will have to work in two, possibly three shifts.

In order to make registration convenient and easy, 25,000 places of registration will be established throughout Canada, with from one to twelve booths at each place. The location of these booths will be advertised by Proclamation and through the local press.

Canada will be divided into 230 districts, each in charge of a Registrar, who is instructed to surround himself with a competent staff of deputies and assistant deputies in whatever numbers the work may require.

# **Volunteer Workers Urgently Needed**

To carry out this vast programme efficiently and completely, intelligent voluntary helpers are essential. Individuals, women's societies, clubs, fraternal societies, church organizations and municipal organizations are asked to help.

The Board appeals with confidence to the patriotism of every Canadian man and

woman and to the pride which every locality must take in doing its own work well, to furnish the necessary number of volunteer deputies and assistants.

Interpreters of all languages will be required. Those qualified should apply to the Registrar of their district at once.
