WILLIAM C. CHARTERS  
COLLECTOR OF TAXESAppointed Last Night by City Council—  
Bylaw Covering Removal and Destruction of Dangerous Buildings to be Passed  
At Next Meeting—Special Committee  
On Isolation Hospital

The June meeting of the City Council was held last night and was brief. All members were in attendance. The chief items of business were the appointment of William C. Charters as collector of taxes on the new scale of commissions and the decision to pass at the next session a bylaw for the distribution and removal of buildings dilapidated or dangerous. This will be particularly for the purpose of improving fire risks in the business blocks, the interiors of which contain a number of dangerous structures. The matter of erecting an Isolation Hospital again was before the council and a special committee of three was appointed to take up the matter and report.

## Collector Appointed

On the motion of Ald. Reid the resolution of the Finance Committee making new arrangements for the collection of taxes and the payment of a collector, was passed. Also on his motion William C. Charters was appointed collector of taxes, a city constable and server of tax notices, and James Roberts was appointed server of tax notices. The server of tax notices is to be paid for at the rate of five cents each.

Ald. Reid reported that the Finance Committee had conferred with the Finance Committee of Devon Town Council on the matter of non-resident assessment. No conclusion was reached but another meeting was to be held.

## Band Concerts

Ald. Cooper for the Music Committee reported that the schedule of hand concerts had been increased by seven concerts and the full number of con-

certs would be given.

## Tussock Moths

For the committee on the Tussock Moth, Ald. McKay reported that the moths still were breeding. It had been found impossible to get men off the street work to destroy nests.

The special committee on the bathing beach reported progress.

## Isolation Hospital

A communication from the Board of Health Chairman, Mr. J. M. Wiley, was read. It requested that attention be given the matter of an Isolation Hospital.

His Worship Mayor Hanson strongly urged that a special committee be appointed to take up this matter.

Ald. Walker moved that a special committee of three be appointed.

Ald. Baxter reported upon the work done by a special committee of the preceding council in connection with the same matter.

Ald. Shea urged that action be taken as soon as possible. He outlined previous action but said the matter had been allowed to drop.

The motion was carried and Mayor Hanson appointed Ald. Walker and Baxter and Ald. Barker as the committee.

Ald. Cooper reported verbally upon the arrangement for repairing the damage done the City Hall by the recent fire.

## Building Bylaw

Ald. Wilkinson drew attention to the fact that a small fire in the morning had emphasized the necessity of enforcing the law empowering the city to remove dilapidated and dangerous buildings. The structure which he referred to was the old ice-house

## Registration Day

"Registration Day", the date of which is June 22, 1918, will give every Canadian affected by the law an opportunity to perform the great national duty of citizenship.

Registrars will be appointed for every federal constituency; these in turn will appoint deputy registrars in sufficient number to register the entire population. Registration offices or booths will be opened in conveniently situated locations, in factories, school houses, halls, etc., in every municipality, and certificates of registration will be issued to every registrant.

## Volunteer Assistance Encouraged

In order to facilitate this gigantic task, Councils, School Boards, Boards of Trade, Labour and fraternal organizations, Patriotic and Red Cross Societies, are invited to assist the registration officials in every possible manner, by providing free of charge suitable locations, school buildings, etc., and by furnishing volunteer helpers to do the clerical work. The registration offices will be kept open from 7 a. m. to 10 p. m.; hence the necessity of providing lighting facilities for the registration places.

## Registration a National Duty

While non-registration entails many penalties of the most serious character, it is expected that the Canadian people will look upon registration as a great national duty, to be performed not out of a sense of compulsion but rather in a spirit of pure patriotism and as an act of encouragement to our gallant overseas defenders. The registration of the man and woman power of Canada will go forth to the world as the solemn expression of Canada's unalterable determination to support her own and the allied armies until the final victory.

## Registration Will Strengthen Morale of the Army

The few minutes required for registration, or the one day's salary donated by the willing workers, will be a small sacrifice indeed compared to those now being made by Canadian manhood in the forefront of the battle line. Yet it will be of inestimable value in maintaining the splendid morale of our unsurpassed citizen soldiers to know that those for whom they are fighting on the fields of France and Flanders are not recreant to the solemn duty of the hour in their beloved Canada. The duty calls for the exercise of every generous and high resolve in all the avocations of a spirited people whose very existence as a people and whose heritage is involved in the issue of the struggle. For the purpose of registration, all the Counties in the Province of New Brunswick have been grouped into one superintendency.

These constitute a registration district. I have been honoured with the charge of Superintendent of Registration for the district outlined, a charge I felt I could accept with the confident expectation that all good citizens of this Province would co-operate in order to render the task less onerous and to bring it to a successful conclusion.

## Education Necessary

It is particularly desirable that clergymen of all denominations, members of Parliament, school teachers, professional agriculturalists and members of other professions, journalists, captains of industry, members of council,—in short all those who by reason of their social position wield great influence, should make known the requirements and the purposes of registration, in order that no false conception of its import may gain ground, or jeopardize its success.

The population of the Counties included in this registration unit, according to official statistics of the Province of New Brunswick is approximately three hundred and thirty thousand. Well over one half, possibly two thirds of this number will be subjects for registration.

## The Call and The Response

The people of New Brunswick responded nobly to the urgent demands of the war; large numbers of their best young manhood have left and are still leaving for the front; they may be found in all the different army services; many have made the supreme sacrifice, others have been wounded or invalidated by sickness; all have gained imperishable renown on the blood-stained fields of Ypres, St. Julien, Lens, Fesubert, Arras, Vimy, Passchendaele and elsewhere. The record of their achievements is the immortal heritage of New Brunswick for all time. Out of their abundance our people have contributed freely to the different war relief funds and organizations; shall we be less generous now in making a much smaller contribution to the great cause by simply placing ourselves on record as a united people, mobilized for the pur-

pose of helping these boys of our own flesh and blood who are battling overseas for all we now so bountifully enjoy?

Let our message from New Brunswick on Registration Day be one of sympathy and steadfast purpose to our soldiers at the front; in common with the rest of Canada let our answers to the calls of the Registration Board be the clarion voice of a united people, conscious of the justice of the cause, and animated by a common determination to do all in its power to have that cause prevail.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

## DOCUMENTS TO BE CARRIED

by every male person who is not on active service in any of His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces, or in the Naval or Military Forces of any of His Majesty's Allies, and who apparently may be, or is reasonably suspected to be, within the description of **Class One** under the Military Service Act, 1917, who for any reason may have claimed that he is not within **Class One** under the Act.

NOTICE is hereby given that, under the provisions of an Order in Council (P.C. 1013), of the 20th April, 1918, upon and after the 1st day of June, 1918, every male person who is not on active service in any of His Majesty's Naval or Military Forces, or in the Naval or Military Forces of His Majesty's Allies, and who apparently may be, or is reasonably suspected to be, within the description of Class One under the Military Service Act, 1917, by whom or on whose behalf, it is at any time affirmed, claimed or alleged that he is not, whether by reason of age, status, nationality, exception, or otherwise, within Class One under the Military Service Act, 1917, as defined for the time being or that, although within the said Class, he is exempted from or not liable to military service; shall have with him upon his person at all times or in or upon any building or premises where he at any time is,

## AGE

If it be claimed that he is not within the class by reason of age, an official certificate of the date of his birth, or a certificate of his age signed by two reputable citizens residing in the community in which he lives and having knowledge of the fact; or

## MARRIAGE

If it be claimed that he is not within the Class by reason of marriage, a certificate, either official or signed by two reputable citizens residing in the community in which he lives and having knowledge of the facts, certifying to his marriage and that his wife is living; or

## NATIONALITY

If it be claimed that he is not within the Class by reason of his nationality, a certificate of his nationality signed by a Consul or Vice-Consul of the foreign State or Country to which he claims his allegiance is due; or a passport issued by the Government of that Country establishing his nationality; or

## ACTIVE SERVICE

If it be claimed that he is exempted as a member of any of His Majesty's Forces or as having since the 4th August, 1914, served in the Military or Naval Forces of Great Britain or her Allies in any theatre of actual war and has been honourably discharged therefrom, official documents or an official certificate evidencing the fact; or

## CLERGY

If it be claimed that he is exempted as a member of the clergy, or of any recognized order of an exclusively religious character, or is a minister of a religious denomination existing in Canada on 29th August, 1917, or as being a

member of any other society or body, a certificate of the fact signed by an office-holder competent so to certify under the regulations of the church, order or denomination, society or body, to which he belongs; or

## EXEMPTION

\* If it be claimed that he is exempted from or not liable to military service by reason of any exemption granted or claimed or application pending under the Military Service Act, 1917, or the regulations thereunder, his exemption papers, or a certificate of the Registrar or Deputy Registrar of the district to which he belongs evidencing the fact; or

## OTHER CLASS

If it be claimed that he is not within the Class, or that he is exempted, not liable or excepted upon any other ground, a certificate of two reputable citizens residing in the community where he lives having knowledge of the fact upon which the claim is founded and certifying thereto;

## FAILURE TO CARRY REQUISITE EVIDENCE

If upon or after the 1st day of June, 1918, any such male person be found without the requisite evidence or certificate upon his person or in or upon the building or premises in which he is, he shall thereupon be presumed to be a person at the time liable for military service and to be a deserter or defaulter without leave;

## PENALTY

And he shall also be liable upon summary conviction to a fine not exceeding \$50 or to imprisonment for a period not exceeding one month, or to both such fine and imprisonment; and moreover, any such person may forthwith be taken into military custody and may be there detained and required to perform military duty in the Canadian Expeditionary Force so long as his services shall be required, unless or until the fact be established to the satisfaction of competent authority that he is not liable for military duty.

## FALSE CERTIFICATE

The use, signing or giving of any such certificate as hereinbefore mentioned shall, if the certificate be in any material respect false or misleading to the knowledge of the person using, signing, or giving the same, be an offence, punishable, upon summary conviction, by a penalty not exceeding five hundred dollars, and by imprisonment for any term not exceeding six months and not less than one month.
