U-BOATS STILL OPERATING OFF NEW ENGLAND COAST

Have Torpedoed Four Steamers and Seven Sailing Vessels According to a Report Issued by Naval Department --- French Steamer Was Saved by a Cruiser---Aviators Join in the Hunt

Washington, June 4—Enemy submarines still were operating off the American coast today. A French tank steamer, the Radiotelephone, the first trans-Atlantic craft to be attacked by the raiders, and which later arrived at an Atlantic port, was saved from destruction at 9.30 o'clock this morning by an American destroyer 65 miles off the Maryland coast. The same destroyer found the coasting schooner Edward R. Baird, Jr., sinking after having been bombed in the same vicinity, making seven schooners and four steamers known officially to have been sunk by the raiders.

Announcement by the navy department of these facts, late tonight disclosed that the raid in American waters had not ended with yesterday's tale of destruction, upsetting the theory that the raiders probably were speeding homeward. Coast patrol vessels had not acted on theory. They now are closing in from all directions on the scene of the raiders' last exploit scouring the sea for further trace of enemy U-boats as they come.

Reports from survivors who were aboard the vessels established the fact during the day that at least two submarines have been at work in American waters. They are the U-37 and the U-151 and a report to the navy department shows that one of them at least had stores to last her three months.

Germans Fail in Purpose

Secretary Daniels believes that the main purpose of the raid is to create a demand among the people for the return of American craft that are fighting submarines abroad. If so, the German effort to crush United States participation in the war, has again met with flat failure. Not a voice has been raised for recall of the fighting ships. The transport lines have been held safely against a lurking foe for days. The troops have gone forward without delay. The raiders have created a panic among coastwise shipping, but they have done no military damage whatever.

So far as coastwise shipping goes it is certain that everything at sea equipped with radio knows of the raid and is moving on courses to avoid them. The sailing craft are also getting the word. There were also indications today that the army aviation service had joined in the U-boat hunt. No statement of the orders given could be obtained, but it is believed a considerable number of fliers have mobilized near the coast to co-operate with the naval patrol squadrons.

The picking up of a floating mine off the New Jersey shore was announced today by the navy department. Undoubtedly it was dropped by one of

the enemy U-boats. Possibly the raider was closely pursued and sought to lay a trap for her pursuer or she might have hoped the bomb would prove to be in the path of a convoy flotilla.

Tank Steamer Floated

Washington, June 4—The tank steamer Herbert L. Pratt, damaged yesterday by a German submarine off the Delaware Capes, has been floated and is now being towed to harbor for repairs, the navy department announced tonight.

Drowned From Lifeboat

Lewes, Delaware, June 4—Sixteen of the thirty-five persons who were in the motorboat of the Carolina landed here today were drowned during a severe thunder storm Sunday night while the boat was drifting about the ocean, seeking rescue.

Harrowing Tale of Survivors

Lewes, June 4—Nineteen survivors passengers and crew of the submarine steamship Carolina were landed here today and brought a harrowing tale of the sea, which included the repeated capsizing of the motor launch in which they escaped from the doomed ship, a night of frenzied bailing with bare hands, the news of the loss of sixteen of their number and the remarkable rescue of a girl who was found clinging to the bodies of two drowned men while they drifted helpless on the ocean, during a severe thunderstorm Sunday night.

AUSTRALIANS ARE PRAISED

British Headquarters in France, June 5.—The Australian troops figured largely in the brilliant little success of Sunday night between Strazeele and Lamotte. Ground was gained in this district, which is the sector in which the first Australian division, was billeted on its arrival in North France in March, 1916. A considerable proportion of the prisoners are mere lads of the 1919 class.

Porcupine in Tree

A porcupine occupied a safe position in a tree on King Street a short distance above York all day Monday and made his escape Monday night. Early Monday morning Police Sergt. Hughes saw the animal on the sidewalk. It made up a tree but encountered a cat there which showed fight and dropped to the ground. The cat was frightened and came down the tree whereupon the porcupine went up again. There is a bounty of fifty cents upon porcupines now but it evidently was not collected in this case.

Double Wedding

A double wedding in which many were interested took place last night at the residence of Mrs. N. J. Smith, King Street, when her daughter Miss Alice Nellie Smith became the bride of Hugo Frederick Mittle of Columbus S. C., and Miss Harriet Elizabeth Allen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Allen of Fredericton became the bride of James William Greig of Philadelphia. The grooms are members of the detachment of the Central Ontario Regiment which is stationed here. Mrs. Mittle has three brothers serving in the Canadian Expeditionary Force and Mrs. Greig's father has been overseas. The ceremony was performed by Rev. G. C. Warren, pastor of the Brunswick Street Baptist Church. Many relatives and friends of the contracting parties were present. The two brides are young, being respectively sixteen and seventeen years old.
