MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917

UBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that by the of Canada in Council of the 20th of April, 1918, and registered post, for which no Canada postage is required. the Proclamation of 4th May, 1918, recently published, attained or shall attain the age of 19 years and who is address. unmarried or a widower without children must, (unless he is within one of the classes of persons mentioned in arrest. the schedule of Exceptions to the Military Service Act) whichever date shall be the later.

Such report must be in writing and must give his name in full, the date of his birth and his place of residence and also his usual post office address.

The report must be addressed to the Registrar or Deputy effect of the regulations of the Governor General District in which he resides (see below) and shall be sent by

Young men so reporting will not be placed on active service every male British subject resident in Canada, till further notice. They must, however, notify the appropriate born on or since the 13th of October, 1897, who has Registrar or Deputy Registrar of any change of residence or

> On receipt of the report an identification card will be forwarded by the Registrar which will protect the bearer from

report as hereinafter directed on or before the 1st day of importance to those affected. Failure to report within the time Punctual compliance with these requirements is of great June, 1918, or within ten days after his 19th birthday, limited will expose the delinquent to severe penalties and will in addition render him liable to immediate apprehension for Military Service.
