YANKEES' SUNDAY WAS DISTURBED

Sabbath Quiet Like That of a Small American Town Disrupted by a Hun Air Raid.

With the American Army near Lunenburg, France, May 23.—It was probably quiet in your town Sunday. If spring arrived with as bright a smile at home as she did here, the sun was shining. There was a longing to get on the sunny side of the house or out into the country and stretch out for a "sun bath." You probably went to church in the morning. Or possibly you spent the entire day on the first motor ride and picnic lunch in the open. At all events it was Sunday and a quiet day.

It was a quiet day in a certain little town nestled at the base of a hill near Lunenburg too. Americans were there just as they are in your town. If you live in Ohio you probably know many of them. But the streets of this town have to be cleaned periodically of bricks, stones and mortar blown out of the walls of the houses by German shells. A khaki clad boy from Columbus sat at a switchboard in a crumbled and crumbling building putting through calls for "Dayton," "Cincinnati," "Zanesville," "Chillicothe," "Youngstown," and a dozen other places you know of. The calls for various points such as battalion headquarters, artillery positions and what not are made in code. Each post has therefore taken the name of some town at home.

Sunday Paraders Take Cover

The crooked streets were full of men. There were no women or children. It was about 3 o'clock. The United Press automobile bumped its way over what was one a smooth street to near what was once the "public square."

"Hello," greeted a Marion boy, "you're just about in time for the afternoon entertainment. They have been popping them around close for the last half hour and are beginning to get nearer the town."

Frequent shell bursts could be heard not far away. Each one seemed to come a little nearer. A French band kicked its way through the dust up to the square. Instruments were unlimbered and a concert was soon under

way. French and American soldiers crowded about.

"Zee-e-e-Whang," a shell could be heard coming and then let loose just on the edge of the town.

The band didn't miss a note.

"Zoo-oo-oo-oo—wham bang," another blocks away. Dust and bricks flew into the air above the tops of the shattered houses. Then they began arriving a little more regularly. Part of a wall would cave in here and the tired ruins of another building would be stirred up there. The streets began to clear. Everybody stood up close to the house walls rather than in the middle of the street. The band was still playing.

A little Frenchman hustled down to the corner of the square. Above the music of the band sounded the shrill notes of a bugle raised to his lips.

"Avion," was the word passed from one end of the village to the other.

A German airplane had crossed the lines and was over the town. Shells were still dropping around and the Boche aviator might add a collection of bombs.

"All Clear" is Sounded

"Better get your machine under cover, or you might have to walk home," advised a sergeant from Cleveland. The driver was signalled to follow the sergeant's advice and headed for what was left of a stable. The band finished the selection it was playing but by this time the audience was out of sight. Then came long moments of waiting. Heads were poked from doorways and windows and everybody stole a look into the sky for the Boche. A French plane appeared and the enemy scurried away. Another blast from the bugle.

"All clear."

The band struck up again. Shells continued to fall, but after a listen at the sound of the explosions to locate them the audience began to gather

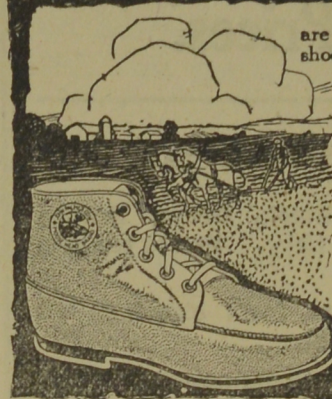
"War is certainly more complicated than it formerly was."

MILITARY SERVICE ACT, 1917

PUBLIC NOTICE is hereby given that by the effect of the regulations of the Governor General of Canada in Council of the 20th of April, 1918, and the Proclamation of 4th May, 1918, recently published, every male British subject resident in Canada, born on or since the 13th of October, 1897, who has attained or shall attain the age of 19 years and who is unmarried or a widower without children must, (unless he is within one of the classes of persons mentioned in the schedule of Exceptions to the Military Service Act) report as hereinafter directed on or before the 1st day of June, 1918, or within ten days after his 19th birthday, whichever date shall be the later.

Such report must be in writing and must give his name in full, the date of his birth and his place of residence and also his usual post office address.

The report must be addressed to the Registrar or Deputy Registrar under the Military Service Act of the Registration District in which he resides (see below) and shall be sent by registered post, for which no Canada postage is required.

Young men so reporting will not be placed on active service till further notice. They must, however, notify the appropriate Registrar or Deputy Registrar of any change of residence or address.

On receipt of the report an identification card will be forwarded by the Registrar which will protect the bearer from arrest.

Punctual compliance with these requirements is of great importance to those affected. Failure to report within the time limited will expose the delinquent to severe penalties and will in addition render him liable to immediate apprehension for Military Service.

ISSUED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE,
MILITARY SERVICE BRANCH, this 15th day of May, 1918.

NOTE: The men required to report should address their reports as follows:

ONTARIO—To the Deputy Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, London, if they reside in the County of Essex, Kent, Lambton, Elgin, Middlesex, Oxford, Waterloo, Wellington, Perth, Huron, or Bruce.

To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Toronto, if they reside in the County of Lincoln, Welland, Haldimand, Norfolk, Brant, Wentworth, Halton, Peel, York, Ontario, Grey, Dufferin, Simcoe, or in the Districts of Muskoka, Parry Sound, Algoma and Nipissing north of the Mattawa and French rivers (including the Townships of Ferris and Bonfield).

To the Deputy Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Kingston, if they reside in the County of Durham, Northumberland, Victoria, Peterborough, Hastings, Prince Edward, Lennox, Addington, Frontenac, Haliburton, Carleton, Dundas, Glengarry, Renfrew, Russell, Stormont, Grenville, Lanark, Leeds, Prescott, or the District of Nipissing south of the Mattawa river (exclusive of the Townships of Ferris and Bonfield).

To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Winnipeg, if they reside in the Districts of Kenora, Rainy River, or Thunder Bay.

QUEBEC—To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Montreal, if they reside in the County of Jacques Cartier, Hochelaga, Laval, Vaudeuil, Soulanges, Napierville, Beauharnois, Chateaugay, Huntington, Laprairie, Argenteuil, Terrebonne, Two Mountains, Montcalm, L'Assomption, Joliette, Berthier, Maskinongé, St. Maurice, Three Rivers, St. Johns, Iberville, Missisquoi, Brome, Shefford, Rouville, Chambly, Vercheres, St. Hyacinthe, Bagot, Drummond, Richelieu, Yamaska, Nicolet, Arthabaska, Sherbrooke, and Stanstead.

QUEBEC—Continued

To the Deputy Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Quebec, if they reside in the County of Wolfe, Richmond, Compton, Beauce, Bellechasse, Bonaventure, Dorchester, Gaspé, Kamouraska, Lévis, L'Islet, Champlain, Charlevoix, Chicoutimi, Montmorency, Quebec, Portneuf, Saguenay, Lotbinière, Montmagny, Matane, Megantic, Rimouski and Temiscouata.

To the Deputy Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Hull, if they reside in the County of Timiskaming, Pontiac, Ottawa and Labelle.

NOVA SCOTIA—To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Halifax, if they reside in the Province of Nova Scotia.

NEW BRUNSWICK—To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, St. John, if they reside in the Province of New Brunswick.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND—To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Charlottetown, if they reside in the Province of Prince Edward Island.

BRITISH COLUMBIA—To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Vancouver, if they reside in the Province of British Columbia.

SASKATCHEWAN—To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Regina, if they reside in the Province of Saskatchewan.

ALBERTA—To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Calgary, if they reside in the Province of Alberta.

MANITOBA—To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Winnipeg, if they reside in the Province of Manitoba.

YUKON—To the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1917, Dawson, if they reside in the Yukon Territory.
