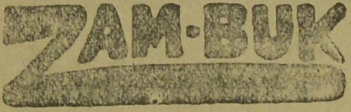

opinion of the Board a license fee should be charged to all persons who retail milk in the city and every person licensed to sell milk should pay a fair price for his license and we trust that the Council will arrange to take this matter up with our Board. Attached you will find report of Analyst Hagerman.

Garbage and Manures.

New regulations covering the above were made by the Board last spring. There has been great improvement in the care and removal of garbage, but further improvement must be made. The regulation and removal of manure and the keeping it in not more than one horse loads in the city has not been carried out as it should be. It is the intention after the first of May next, to take legal proceedings against any and all persons neglecting to carry out the order of the Board.

General Health.

During the year the general health of the community has been good,

there being no serious outbreak of any contagious disease, as shown by the report of Health Inspector McKay, attached to this report. You will note that there has been a decrease in diphtheria cases of 24. The Board are under the impression that this decrease is the result of better sanitary conditions in the city schools. The Board of School Trustees, in connection with their secretary, Mr. C. A. Sampson, cooperated with the Board of Health and carried out the recommendations of Health Inspector McKay, with the above good results. Typhoid fever shows an increase of seven cases. The Board have endeavored to find out by making careful inquiries if this could in any way be attributed to the milk or water supplied, but we could find no facts to support that theory. But in conversation with Mr. Hall, an expert on health matters, employed by the Provincial Board of Health, he informed Mr. Dibblee (after going carefully through our records) that if there was any particular reason for this increase it would more probably be in the milk supply rather than in the water. On account of that opinion our milk inspection will next year be most rigid.

Unfortunately a case of smallpox developed in the Waverly Hotel in November, which caused the hotel to be closed and the inmates quarantined. Compulsory vaccination was ordered by the Provincial Board of Health. This incurred a large expenditure, which will probably amount to \$2,500, account for which will be submitted to you in January. The expenditure caused by this outbreak should, under Rule 70 of the Public Health Act, be a just claim against the province, and in submitting the accounts the Board has included duplicate bills and necessary papers to substantiate the claim.

Isolation Hospital.

For years the Board has been endeavoring to have an isolation hospital built, with no success. When this outbreak of smallpox occurred we had to have a place ready, in case any more cases developed. Under the General Health Act we are not allowed to have a contagious disease hospital outside the city limits, without the permission of the County Council of York. You will therefore understand that it was an impossibility and the only place we were able to secure was the Doherty house on University avenue. So far we are pleased to say it has not been used and we trust we will not have to use it. In fitting up this house we spent \$82.83, which is virtually money thrown away, unless we are able to rent the house until November 1st. We therefore ask the Council, as early in the spring as possible, to commence the erection of an isolation hospital and would suggest that a member of the City Council and a member of our Board proceed to St. John and inspect the hospital there and report back to the Council and our Board.

ITALIAN TROOPS GIVEN WARM RECEPTION BY THE POPULACE

Italian Headquarters in Italy, Feb. 3 (By the Associated Press.)—The Sassari Brigade of young Sardinians which distinguished itself by cutting its way up to Col Di Bosso last Tuesday, came out of the trenches today.

It was an event which stirred the neighboring country and the peasantry, with children and babies, came from fifty miles around to see these young heroes. The city was gay with flags, the walls were covered with posters, "Hail, Sassari Heroes!" and children carried flowers to strew along the route of their march. The brigade was twenty miles from its camp and it was an inspiring sight as the boyish looking soldiers came down the road. The uniforms were still splashed with the mud of the big fight but they marched proudly and appeared happy over the enthusiastic tribute.

Brigadier General Ferrigo, commander of the brigade, marched at the head with a troop of wounded officers.

U. S. STEAMER WENT ASHORE

(Canadian Press direct wire.)
An Atlantic Port, Feb. 4. — A call for help was received today from an American steamer which ran ashore off the New England coast last night. The ship struck a sandy bottom while in hailing distance of shore. Government vessels were ordered to her assistance.

Coastguard men who went out to the stranded steamer reported that she was resting easy on a sandy ledge and was in no immediate danger. The report said the vessel was unable to make headway last night because of the ice and fog and was fifty miles off her course when she struck the ledge. Three tugs at a nearby port were ordered to hurry to the steamer's assistance as it was believed they would be able to float her.

ALBERTA MINERS GO ON STRIKE

Calgary Alta., Feb. 4. — At nine o'clock this morning, 2,000 coal miners in the Drumseller field ceased to mine coal. The latest trouble started on Saturday when 175 miners at the Moody mine walked out because the operators refused to run a closed shop. It is said that the strike occurred at the instigation of union miners in other parts of the field. Of the 2,000 miners 70 per cent. are aliens, of whom 40 per cent. are alien enemies, the balance being Canadians.

PROPERTY OF EX-CZAR SEIZED

New York, Feb. 4. — Property in a Brooklyn warehouse, said to belong to Nicholas Romanoff, former emperor of Russia, was seized yesterday by deputy sheriffs under a writ of attachment issued by the supreme court of Brooklyn. The court decided last Friday that as long as Mr. Romanoff was emperor no action could be brought against him in New York but since he had lost his position he could be sued as any other private citizen. The attachment was to protect the claim of the aMrine Transporation Service Company on a claim of \$2,615,762 for alleged breach of contract for the shipment of supplies to Russia. The property which is said to be worth \$20,000,000 consists of ammunition, rifles, barbed wire and other war material.

FAST HORSES BURN TO DEATH

Montreal, Feb. 4. — The trotting horses Battle King, 209½, Sshradel, Charley, Direct Swift, Hester B. and Doris B. were burned to death in an early morning fire at the Maissonneuve race track stables. Battle King was recently brought here from the United States. Sshradel and Charley won two first, two second and two third prizes. Both horses were the property of Napoleon Daoust, president of the Maissonneuve Driving Club.
