## HON. MR. CARVELL ADDRESSES MONTREAL CANADIAN CLUB

**Says That Canadians Have Got to Raise Eight Hundred Million Dollars During the Fiscal Year---The Situation Must be Squarely Faced---The Tariff Will Not Stand Further Boosting.**

Montreal, Feb. 18. — Hon. Frank B. Carvell, Minister of Public Works, addressing the members of the Montreal Canadian Club today, said that during the coming fiscal year the country had to raise something like \$800,000,000 and while he was not announcing any policy he declared that if they could not raise the money by way of tariffs there was only one source of revenue and that was by asking the men who had the money to contribute a portion of it by way of income tax.

To Face Situation.

"We have to face the situation," declared Mr. Carvell, "we must steel ourselves to face conditions and must realize that this money must be forthcoming. Every dollar has been taken out of the people by way of customs taxation that can be. It is as high as anybody can wish to see it, and there is no way of getting the necessary money except by a system of direct taxation, and I want to press that home on the people of Canada."

rect taxation, and I want to press that home on the people of Canada."

Mr. Carvell expressed a wish that the people of Canada would give a little more attention to the great economic and trade questions which were before the Dominion. If they did he had no fear for the future of the Dominion with all its natural wealth and resources.

A Serious Condition.

Mr. Carvell said there was hardly a man in Canada who was not in a better financial position individually since the war started than he was before. But the government of Canada has been getting poorer and poorer and today it was faced with a condition such as no government had ever faced before, in Canada. Before the war the revenues of the country were about \$175,000,000 practically all from excise duties, and that sum had been expended wisely perhaps or unwisely, but it came so easy that it did not make much difference. During the present year they had to raise \$250,000,000 to carry on the ordinary affairs of the country. Sixty million dollars had to be provided for interest and at least ten millions or more for soldiers' pensions, and that must go as high as twenty millions. In addition to that \$400,000,000 had to be provided to pay for the goods which were being sold by Canada to Great Britain and the Allies which they could not pay for at the moment. During the present fiscal year Canada would send to Great Britain probably over \$900,000,000 worth of goods, including munitions, but unfortunately she has only imports amounting to \$90,000,000 worth and that left an adverse balance of trade of \$800,000,000 which must be taken care of in some way. The railway problem would take up probably \$35,000,000 or \$40,000,000, cheese-pare the best way they could use the government had to provide at least \$145,000,000 to pay its debts and carry on the army in Canada in addition to \$200,000,000 for the army across the seas, although this latter sum would not be actually paid out.

The Victory Loan.

Mr. Carvell referred to the recent Victory Loan and said he had sufficient faith in the people of Canada that if next August of September there was a call for another \$400,000,000 the government would get it.

"We may just as well realize," he declared, "that the time has come when we must be self-supporting. We must buy our products and send them across the ocean and must furnish the necessary money and the only way to do it is for the people of Canada to dig down into their pockets, and I believe they will do it." The minister referred to the balance of trade against Canada in the United States and said there was at least \$350,000,000 to be provided for this, and some scheme must be devised to do it.

Canada's Railways.

Discussing the railway program he described the C. P. R. as a splendidly managed dividend paying concern, the Grand Trunk as well managed but unable to meet the interest of seven millions to be added on it by the Grand Trunk Pacific, the Canadian Northern as a white elephant, the National Transcontinental as a splendid railway but no revenue getter, and the Intercolonial which had always been, up to the present, a political machine, and therefore very, very badly managed. He declared that up to date no government in Canada had ever succeeded in operating a railway properly but maybe the present government possessed more ability than its predecessors and possibly might be able to do what others had failed to do, but it was a lamentable fact that government operation of railways had been one of the tragic farces the country had ever seen.

Alluding to the government shipping program Mr. Carvell said the government felt it its paramount duty to make a start with \$35,000,000 or \$40,000,000 and he said next year it would be still greater because although the cost per ton might be greater still the country must have ships. He believed shipbuilding might become a great industry in Canada and hoped the steel manufacturers would have sufficient ability, energy and business acumen to so arrange things that the plates would be rolled in Canada in future and not imported from foreign countries.
