

## LIGHT BEER CONTAINED NO ALCOHOL

### A CURIOUS RESULT OF A RECENT ANALYSIS

**Two Cases of Violation of Prohibition Act at Marysville—Beer Samples Taken for Analysis.**

Two charges of alleged violation of the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916 were tried today in Marysville. They are the outcome of a seizure made in the street by Town Marshal Saunders a short time ago. They were tried before Police Magistrate Clayton, Chief Inspector Wilson is the informant.

#### Very Light Beer.

In Fredericton a large number of samples of light beer were taken recently for purpose of analysis. This will be done periodically. One curious result of the analysis in one case was the report that a sample of a certain light beer manufactured in Montreal did not contain a trace of alcohol.

Attention has been called to this beer through the fact that it was shipped labelled "Intoxicating Liquor for Personal Use."

#### To Purchase Tractors.

Fifty Ford tractors are to be used on farms in New Brunswick before the end of the present year, according to the information given Premier Foster at Ottawa last week. Two thousand and machines of this type are to be purchased by the Dominion government to lessen the evils of labor shortage, and the province will repurchase them from the Dominion at cost price. Twenty-five will be delivered in New Brunswick in the spring and the balance later. Some farmers are going to buy from the province at cost but others will be distributed throughout the province.

## JOHN F. PAYNE PASSED AWAY LAST NIGHT

### IN PROVINCIAL SERVICE FOR FIFTY-THREE YEARS

**Funeral Wednesday Afternoon—Appointed Page in House in 1864—Caretaker Since 1908.**

One of Fredericton's oldest and best known residents passed away last night in the person of John Frederick Payne, who died at the Lorne Hotel where he had boarded for some time. He had been ill for but a few days. He was aged seventy years and was a native of Fredericton. Two sisters survive, Mrs. Richard Pinder and Miss Emily Payne, both of this city.

The funeral of the deceased will take place at 2.30 Wednesday afternoon from the residence of Miss Vradenburg, corner of Carleton and George streets. Very Rev. Dean Neales will conduct the service and interment will be made at the Rural cemetery.

#### Long and Faithful Service.

The deceased for fifty-four years was an official of the Provincial Legislative Buildings in various capacities, beginning in February, 1864, as page and ending at the time of his death as caretaker. During all that time he gave to the province a faithful service. He was appointed caretaker of the Parliament Buildings in 1908, previous to that time having been a member of the staff of the buildings and a messenger. By occupation he was a painter. It is worthy of note that his father also had a position at the legislative buildings.

#### Veteran of Fenian Raid.

The deceased was a veteran of the first Fenian Raid, having accompanied one of the Fredericton companies of volunteers to St. Andrews in 1866, although little more than a boy at the time. For his service at that time he received the Fenian Raid Medal issued by the Canadian government about twenty years ago.

#### Under Many Administrations.

As a member of the civil service of the province he served under many administrations including the last one prior to Confederation. He was a page when the late Sir John Allen, afterward Chief Justice of New Brunswick, was speaker of the House of Assembly. Much of his service was given in the old wooden building which, after being destroyed by fire, was replaced by the present building. He was present during the Wetmore, King, Fraser, Hannington, Blair, Emmerson, Tweedie, Pugsley, Robinson, Hazen, Clarke, Murray and Foster administrations, and was able to recall many of the incidents of early debates which he always claimed were

## NO SALES OF TIMBER LIMITS TILL AUGUST

### LARGE SALES EXPECTED AFTER AUGUST 1ST.

**Twenty-year Leases Then will be Put Up—Close Season for Partridge Practically Sure.**

It was announced at the Provincial Department of Lands and Mines this morning that there would be no further sales of timber limits until August 1st. Shortly after that date there will be a large sale. This will be due to the fact that five years ago all holders of limits were given the option of renewing their leases until 1933, the leases to run for twenty years. Many did take advantage of the opportunity but others did not. The leases not sold then will be put up in August.

#### Close Season for Partridge.

It is also announced that a close season for partridge will be declared shortly. This will run for several years. Just what the term will be is not known but it may be three years or longer. Hon. E. A. Smith, Minister of Lands and Mines has taken a keen interest in the protection of the partridge. The information secured by him during the past autumn pointed without doubt to the fact that the bird would be extinct in New Brunswick within a few years unless adequate protection was afforded within a short time.
