

## ISOLATION HOSPITAL WAS DISCUSSED

CITY COUNCIL COMMITTEE BEFORE BOARD OF HEALTH

Building at St. John Likely to be Inspected—Milk Supply to be Further Improved.

The special committee of the City Council appointed to confer with the Board of Health on the matter of an isolation hospital for Fredericton waited upon the Board last night and discussed the matter. The committee is composed of Ald. Walker, Ald. Baxter and Ald. Barker. Both the Board and committee agreed that it was desirable that a suitable structure be erected at a date as early as possible. The question of site was discussed and it was decided that a portion of the Municipal Home grounds, York Street, would be suitable, connection with the sewerage system being made easily. The style of building also was discussed. St. John has a building which can be used for purposes of isolation and it was considered advisable that a committee go to that city and inspect the building with a view toward securing ideas which might be adopted in Fredericton. The secretary of the Board of Health was instructed to get in touch with the health authorities of St. John and secure information. The committee of the city council will report on the matter at the next meeting.

### Health Conditions Good

The report of Health Inspector Fleming showed that the condition of public health in Fredericton during June was good. A number of premises were inspected and improvements ordered.

### Condition of Milk

The city analyst reported upon ten samples of milk. Six were found satisfactory and four not satisfactory. The pasteurized samples were particularly satisfactory. The dealers who furnished the unsatisfactory samples will be notified that the quality must be improved. If the next test is not satisfactory their licenses to sell in the city will be cancelled.

## DISEASE AMONG BEES COMBATTED BY DEPARTM'T

AMERICAN FOUL BROOD PREVALENT IN PLACES

Campaign Organized to Stamp Out the Disease Which Has Caused Decrease in the Honey Production.

At one time large crops of honey were harvested by bee-keepers in the lower part of the province, but during the last few years a large decrease has been noted in the number of colonies of bees kept there. This decrease has been due in some cases to poor wintering but in others it has been caused by disease.

The American Foul Brood has been known to exist in that part of the province for a number of years but with the exception of one or two cases no effort has been made to control or eradicate it.

The provinces of Ontario and Quebec are vigorously fighting this disease, the treatment of which is very simple, and when thoroughly carried out, effective.

### Campaign Begun

With the object of acquainting the beekeepers with the appearance and symptoms of this disease so that they may detect and treat it, the Department of Agriculture, through the Provincial Apiarist, is carrying on a campaign for the control and eradication of the disease wherever it exists in New Brunswick. During the past few weeks nearly every apiary has been inspected in the districts where the disease was known to exist and the disease was definitely located in four different districts.

### Apiaries Inspected

On June 18th and 19th, Mr. L. T. Floyd, Provincial Apiarist, assisted by Mr. C. B. Gooderham, Assistant Apiarist, Ottawa, visited a large number of apiaries and inspected more than 50 colonies of bees. On the afternoon of June 19th they held a demonstration in the apiary of Mr. Daniel A. Coates, Corn Hill, a large number of interested beekeepers being present. Mr. Floyd spoke on the opportunities for beekeeping and was followed by Mr. Gooderham who talked on the different diseases affecting bees, demonstrating the treatments of the diseases by the use of affected colony. He stated that the disease germs were carried from hive to hive by the robber bees and in this manner the disease spread from colony to colony and from apiary to apiary. As the disease developed and increased the colony gradually diminished in numbers until all the bees were gone and their honey was left to be carried away by bees from healthy colonies. Mr. Gooderham also demonstrated the most approved methods of treatment

## SUMMARIZING REGISTRATION RESULTS SLOW

RETURNS FROM RURAL DISTRICTS NOT YET IN

St. Mary's Indian Reserve Has Dense Population—Number Registered in Fredericton About 6,000.

The summarizing of the results of the registration in York and Sunbury counties on June 22nd is proceeding slowly on account of tardiness on the part of some of the deputy registrars and also on account of some of their work being imperfectly done. Sheriff Hawthorne will not have the statistics compiled for some time yet.

The City of Fredericton registration showed a total of 5,961 of which 3,304 are women and 2,657 are men.

The Parish of Manners Sutton as far as reported shows a total registration of 735 of which 366 are men and 349 women. At McAdam the registration was 971 of which 368 were women and 603 men.

At the St. Mary's Indian Reserve the total registration was 110 of which 57 were men and 53 women. When it is taken into consideration that persons under the age of sixteen were not registered it will be seen that the reserve for its area has a dense population.

Mr. Floyd invited those present to become members of the Beekeeper's Association which now has a membership of 83 and is doing good work in the interests of the industry.

### Interest Growing

The Department is able to report a large interest throughout the province in beekeeping work this year and the names of 400 different beekeepers are now on its mailing list.

It is planned to hold similar demonstrations and field meetings in different localities throughout the province and announcement of the dates will follow in due course.
