KING GEORGE A DEMOCRATIC MONARCH

(New York Sun)

London, Representative John R. Connelly of Colby, Kan., says King George is as democratic as the mayor of a small town in his home State. Connelly, who is editor of the Colby Free Press, in an article describing his impressions of British royalty at the reception given by the King to a Congressional committee, published today, remarks:

"We Americans are not used to meeting royalty and naturally had some feeling when we met the King and Queen of England and their daughter. The King, Queen and the Princess immediately removed this embarrassment. Their greeting was most cordial.

"The King gave us a regular Kansas handshake and then we talked for half an hour. The fact that he spent four years in the Navy while a boy, perhaps made him at once find the subject upon which we were both best informed. He discussed the subject with much interest and understanding.

"The committee came away with the impression that the King is a most human fellow. He knew how to meet the committee as just ordinary Americans and make them feel easy. He treated us fine—just as if he were the mayor of a small Kansas town.

"The King is rather small of stature not so tall as the Queen. He enjoys a good story. He expressed the hope to us that after the war the Americans will not think the Briton stuck up, and that the Briton will be more tolerant toward the American disposition to boast.

"The Queen is fine appearing. She talked interestingly about the work to be done for wounded soldiers. She is most active in this work, going personally to various hospitals. She inquired about the interest of American women. She had read of their activities in the Red Cross and along other lines of relief.

"Princess Mary, the only daughter of the King and Queen, has four of five brothers in military service."

IMPORTANT JUDGMENT

Montreal, Aug. 6—The parliament of Canada, far from having the right to delegate to the governor-general in council power to suspend the right of habeas corpus in Canada, does not even possess for itself the power of suspension. This was the conclusion of judgment rendered this morning in the superior court by Mr. Justice Monet, in ordering the military authorities to release Blanshay and Stutovitch, two youths of foreign birth now held as deserters. Habeas Corpus proceedings in the case of each had been taken some weeks ago by Percy C. Ryan, K. C. In the case of Adriane Rousse, in which the circumstances were different, the judge refused the petition.

There was another issue in the Blanshay and Stutovitch cases, that on nationality. In this the judge held that inasmuch as the two petitioners had not voted in the last election they could not be called upon to perform military duty. In naturalization the state conferred certain privileges and expected certain responsibilities. When the privileges were withheld the responsibilities vanished.

Exempted by Tribunal

Both petitioners came to Canada while minors, Blanshay from Russia and Stutovitch from Roumania, and their fathers were naturalized before they were of age. Blanshay, who is 22, was exempted by the local tribunal, and the exemption was maintained by the appeal tribunal. While a further appeal to Ottawa was pending the order-in-council of April 20 was passed cancelling exemptions between the ages of 20 and 22. Accordingly he was taken up as a draftee. Then came the Habeas Corpus proceedings and the minister of Justice intervened in the case.

In the case of Rousse, the judge said, according to the allegations of the Military authorities Rousse was physically well when certain physicians injected into his system the germs of a loathsome disease in order to unfit him for military service. "If the petitioner wished to make himself unfit for military service and actually did what is alleged, I will not interfere. They may treat him and send him to the front," was the judgment.

TO GET AFTER TROUBLE MAKERS

Vancouver, Aug. 7—The government of Canada intends in future to institute proceedings under the industrial disputes investigation act in cases where the act is violated, according to Hon. T. W. Crothers, minister of Labor, for Canada, who is in the city for a few days. The minister also inferred that the government was considering taking action against men who have been exempted from military service because of their employment in essential occupations. Tens of thousands of men in Canada have been exempted from military service because they are engaged in essential occupations and because the exemption was given practically on their promise to remain at that work. There fore where men are treated fairly and reasonably and yet insist on agitation and trouble-making, causing interruptions and even cessation of work, the government may possibly take the action of withdrawing exemptions.
