

TO DEMONSTRATE METHOD OF FIRE PROTECTION

TRAVELLING EXHIBITION CAR ON RAILWAY LINES

Demonstrator from Dept. will
Accompany It—Will be in
Province Rest of the
Month.

Through Mr. Robson Black, secretary of the Canadian Forestry Association, arrangements have been made with the Canadian Pacific Railway for a travelling exhibition car to be taken over the various railway lines of New Brunswick for the purpose of instructing the people of the various communities in the necessity for better protection of the forests from fires. The car is furnished by the C. P. R. and will be given free transportation over the Canadian Government Railways.

Representatives to Accompany It
The Provincial Department of Lands and Mines has arranged to have a representative accompany the car for demonstration purposes. In the French counties a demonstrator speaking French will be with the car.

Modern Methods Demonstrated
The public will be freely admitted to the car in which modern methods of forest protection will be demonstrated. There will be motion pictures and daily lectures, and there will be shown models of an airplane, telephone lines, fire pumps, wireless telegraph apparatus and lookout towers.

One end of the car was resting on the bank of the brook, while the other end of it lay against a birch tree. Had it not been for the tree the car would have been thrown into the brook and all occupants killed. As it was the family escaped with a few bruises. The car was pretty well smashed.

PROSECUTED FOR FIRES IN CLOSE SEASON

RESIDENT OF NASHWAAK OFFENDED ON AUGUST 26

Twenty-five Men Necessary to
Extinguish Blaze—Similar
Case in Restigouche
County.

A resident of Nashwaak will appear before the Police Magistrate here tomorrow to answer to a charge of having set a fire without necessary fire permit on the 26th of August. As it was a very dry windy day, this fire would have done very serious damage to the surrounding forest if twenty-five men had not gathered quickly to extinguish it. His neighbors are much aroused over the carelessness of the man which might have caused serious results.

Restigouche Case
A similar case will be heard in Anderson, Restigouche County on the same date, against a settler who after being personally warned set fire to his slash without a permit on another dry windy day, the 22nd of August, and this fire was not extinguished until after five hundred dollars damage was done.

Heavy Penalty
There is little excuse for this neglect, as the law was thoroughly published in both sections. The maximum penalty for setting a fire in the close season, April 15th to October 15th without a fire permit, is two hundred dollars and costs.

GASOLINE WAS SAVED SUNDAY BY MOTORISTS

DEALERS REFUSED TO SELL IN SOME CASES

Request of Fuel Controller was
Generally Observed—Visiting
Cars Conspicuously
Absent.

The first Sunday under the request of the Fuel Controller that "joy riding" be dispensed with to conserve gasoline passed with every indication that the request was being observed. The hotels here had no registration of visiting motor parties although on preceding Sundays Fredericton was the center of attraction for many motorists on account of its central location. Local cars also were conspicuous by their absence although it had been customary to take week-end trips.

Dealers Declined to Sell

It is understood that some dealers were approached to sell gasoline yesterday and refused although the request of the Fuel Controller did not include them. This evidently had a salutary effect upon those few who would have used their cars.

Some motorists who had begun trips on Saturday completed them last night but others waited until today to finish. Reports from other sections of the province indicate that the request was very well observed and that there was a substantial saving in gasoline.

BORDEN ENDORSES K. OF C. APPEAL

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 16.—The Knights of Columbus Army Huts appeal is exciting much enthusiasm in the upper provinces.

It is announced today that Sir Robert L. Borden has written a strong letter approving of the campaign.

Many municipalities have voted money grants, those in Ontario having, so far, decided to give \$33,000.

The City Council of Quebec has voted \$5,000, and many large individual subscriptions are announced, including \$1,000 from Archbishop Gautier, Ottawa.

The prospects everywhere in Ontario and Quebec are excellent.

News has been received from the overseas directors that there is no commercialization whatever, except in the city clubs. Food, comforts and recreation are provided free at the front. The canteens provide commodities at wholesale cost and are a great boon to the soldiers.
