This question is of importance to the farmers and potato shippers of New Brunswick as the United States market each year takes a large proportion of the potato crop of this part of Canada.

The Regulations The Canadian regulations were made later than the United States regulations but are more stringent. Potatoes of No. 1 grade under the regulations of both the United States and Canada must be free from sunburn frost, disease, blemish, etc., and have a minimum diameter of one and sev en eighths inches for round varieties and one and three quarters inches for long varieties and be all of one variety To allow for variations in sorting five per cent by weight may be under size and three per cent by weight under the other requirements. The Canadian regulations provide the same require ments for No. 2 grade except that this variety need not be uniform.
