These recipes are issued by the
Fredericton Food Control Committee.

Indian Pudding Made With Crumbs.

1 cup fine crumbs,
1 quart skim milk,
One-third cup sugar,
Quarter cup molasses,
2 tablespoons melted butter or
butter substitute,
Quarter teaspoon ginger,
Quarter teaspoon cloves,
Quarter teaspoon cinnamon.

Scald the crumbs in milk, add the
other ingredients and bake 1½ hours
in a slow oven. This pudding may be
made with any kind of bread crumbs,
but it furnishes an especially good
means for using up stale corn bread.

Ginger Bread.

1 cup molasses,
Half cup of boiling water,
One and one-third cups of fine
bread crumbs,
Two-thirds cup of flour,
1 teaspoon baking soda,
1½ teaspoons ginger,
Half teaspoon salt,
4 teaspoons of melted butter or
butter substitute.

Add water to molasses and combine
with dry ingredients mixed together,
then add fat and beat thoroughly.
Bake 25 minutes.

Do your bit in the kitchen. Save
wheat and meat for our men in
France.

VICTORY LOAN EXPENSES

Ottawa, April 13.—When the orders
of the day were called in the House
yesterday afternoon, Mr. Copp, West-
morland, asked the Prime Minister if
the statement of Armand Lavorgne
(reported in the press as having been
made at a Quebec inquest) that he had
been offered a position as chief keeper
of records of the Military Service Act
in Ottawa, was correct.

Sir Robert—"I have not heard of the
matter. I should be very much sur-
prised if any such offer was made."

Sir Robert added that he would
make inquiries.

"This is a world of surprises," com-
mented Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

Hon. A. K. McLean, acting Minister
of Finance, submitted a statement as
to the cost of floating the last Victory
loan. He gave the expenses as fol-
lows:

Organization expenses.....	\$376,000
Publicity campaign, paid to	
Dom. Publicity Committee	163,000
Canadian Press Association	207,000
Remuneration to brokers....	750,000
Commission to canvassers....	1,140,000
Remuneration to bankers....	984,395
Total	\$3,620,395

These expenses, Mr. McLean added,
did not include printing and other in-
cidents which would probably bring the
total to approximately \$5,000,000, or
about one and a quarter per cent. of
the allotment.

Hon. Charles Murphy asked whether
Mr. McLean would bring in a state-
ment showing the amounts paid to
each newspaper for advertising the
Victory loan. He said that a state-
ment of this kind should be made. Mr.
McLean promised to bring down such
a statement.
