## GERMANS FLUNG BACK WITH TERRIBLE LOSSES

News From British Headquarters in France is More Encouraging---Enemy made a Heavy Attack Against a Wide Front and Met With Disaster---Rear Guard Fighting of the British Has Been Suberb.

(Canadian Press direct wire.)  
London, Apr. 14. (via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—Reuter's correspondent wires from British Headquarters in France as follows:

"A bitter east wind is raging in Flanders and visibility is very low. The situation is generally unchanged. The enemy continues to employ fresh troops and we are likewise steadily increasing our force. Consequently the battle is more stationary, although as intense as ever.

"Yesterday morning the Germans launched a heavy attack against a length of front they have been attacking continuously and unsuccessfully for the past two days, undoubtedly calculating that the British were worn out and that another smashing blow would finish us. But fresh reinforcements arrived and the defenders flung back the enemy with terrible losses. The masses of the enemy attack made absolutely inevitable his heavy losses. His formula for shock tactics consists in pushing forward in successive dense waves at close intervals, and as the front line is killed off the others press on by the sheer weight of the men behind. Frequently his advance has been checked by the barrier of piled up corpses.

"Our rearguard fighting has been skillful and valiant beyond words. While the machine gunners from a series of little posts have poured bullets into the enemy until their ammunition has been exhausted, the main body has slowly fallen back upon prepared positions. Each backward step has been made perfectly methodically and we have exacted the full price for what we have yielded. Never have troops fought with such tenacity as our men are now displaying. They have got their backs to the wall indeed, and General Haig's assurance of French support in great strength has vastly heartened them."

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## FREDERICTON GIRL ADMITTED TO B. C. BAR

Miss Gladys Kitchen, Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Willard Kitchen Studied Law in the West.

The Vancouver Province, April 6, says:

"After today Vancouver will have another woman barrister, Miss Gladys Kitchen, B. A., having been admitted to the bar this morning by Mr. Justice Gregory of Victoria. Miss Kitchen believes herself to be the first woman law student to take her entire course of legal study in British Columbia, having been articulated in this city at the office of Mr. A. M. Whittome in 1915, and passing her final examination in February, although the announcement of her success reached her only yesterday.

"She is the youngest daughter of Mr. Willard Kitchen of Shaughnessy Heights, who was formerly a railway man of Fredericton, New Brunswick. Mr. and Mrs. Kitchen and family moved to Vancouver about five years ago.

"The youthful barrister graduated from the University of New Brunswick in 1913. She says that her legal studies were considerably shortened by her university course, although her three years were full of hard work, with an examination to pass each year. Having no law school from which to derive help she had to work after hours on her own initiative and it required a great deal of perseverance, but she says that the time passed quickly. She will be the third woman to practice law here."

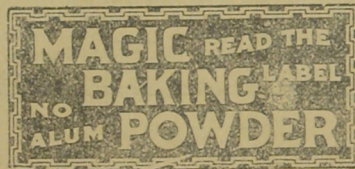
