

LOCAL BAKER HAD HIS LICENSE CANCELLED

10 DAYS' CANCELLATION
IMPOSED ON W. R. DUNBAR

Violation of Regulations Concerning Wheat Substitutes Charged—Term Began Last Saturday.

One of the Fredericton bakers, W. R. Dunbar came to grief recently when he had his license cancelled for a violation of the Canada Food Regulations regarding the use of substitutes for wheat flour. For some time complaints had been registered before Dr. W. C. Keirstead, secretary of the Provincial Food Board that the baker was not using the proper quantities of substitutes with the flour and that some substitutes he had purchased had been returned to the seller.

Reported to Ottawa

As a result of recent investigations set on foot by Dr. Keirstead the matter was reported to the Canada Food Board at Ottawa. The Food Board at Ottawa wrote to the local baker asking for a list of substitutes, the amount of the substitutes purchased and from whom they were purchased. Evidently the report sent in was not found satisfactory by the Canada Food Board as the license of the baker was cancelled for ten days starting on Saturday last at midnight.

JOHN MAXWELL AGED CITIZEN DIED TODAY

PROMINENT IN CITY'S LIFE
A FORMER ALDERMAN

Builder and Contractor—A Native of Tyrone, Ireland—Was Member of Old Cricket Club.

Ex-Ald. John Maxwell, one of Fredericton's best known citizens passed away this morning after a brief illness following a paralytic stroke. The deceased was aged eighty-five years and was a native of Tyrone County, Ireland. He came to New Brunswick at the age of twenty-five and practically all of his lifetime was a resident of Fredericton.

Member of City Council

For several years the deceased represented Carleton Ward in the City Council and while an alderman took a prominent part in the civic government. By occupation ex-Ald. Maxwell was a mason, builder and contractor. He worked on a number of well known buildings in this city. The Chestnut Canoe Factory built some ten years ago was the last.

Old-time Cricketer

In the earlier years of his residence here the deceased was a prominent cricketer. Few if any of the players of that time are now alive. The deceased was particularly well known as a batsman. There are stories of his exploits with the willow still told by the older citizens.

Surviving Relatives

The late ex-Alderman is survived by three daughters, Mrs. James Biggs of Fredericton, Mrs. Thomas E. Dyer and Miss Lillian Maxwell of St. John's. The late Hon. Robert Maxwell of St. John was a son. Mr. J. Herbert Maxwell of Fredericton is a grandson. Among the surviving relatives are five granddaughters, four grandsons and fourteen great-grandchildren.

Funeral Saturday

The funeral will take place Saturday afternoon from the residence of Mr. James Biggs, Regent Street. Service will be conducted at 2.30 by Rev. Canon Cowie. Interment will be made at the Rural Cemetery.

Will Not Leave St. John

Commissioner Fisher, acting mayor of St. John yesterday received word from Montreal that the moving picture film companies had accepted the city's offer to alter the new assessment act so as to tax them on their stock in trade instead of on their income, and that they would not now be obliged to move from St. John as would have been the case had the act remained unamended. The amendment, passed by the council, and accepted by the companies, now needs the sanction of the legislature.

SPECIALIST IN FERTILIZERS & SOILS FOR N. B.

E. M. TAYLOR TAKES
UP IMPORTANT WORK

J. H. King Again Dist. Rep.—Limerock Crushing of Importance—G. H. Prince Returns

Mr. E. M. Taylor, B. S. A., has been appointed Specialist in Soils and Fertilizers for New Brunswick. He has vacated the position of District Representative for the Counties of Albert, Westmorland and Kent to which Mr. J. H. King, B. S. A., has been appointed, having been discharged from military service.

Mr. Taylor has special charge of the work of crushing limerock for the purpose of correcting the acidity of certain soils. By the crushing of this rock a cheap fertilizer can be produced. In this connection a survey of the lime deposits of the province has been made for the Department of Agriculture. Lands which have been burned over in the second growth are peculiarly liable to acidity.

Forestry Conference at Halifax

Mr. G. H. Prince, Chief Forester of New Brunswick, returned this morning from Halifax where he had been in attendance at a conference of forestry experts upon matters of greater forest development in Nova Scotia. The meeting was held in the Provincial Building and addresses were made by a number of those in attendance. Among those present were Clyde Leavitt of Ottawa, Chief Forester of the Commission on Conservation; Ellwood Wilson, Chief Forester of the Laurentide Pulp and Paper Company; Robson Black, Secretary of the Canadian Forestry Society; G. H. Prince, Chief Forester of New Brunswick.

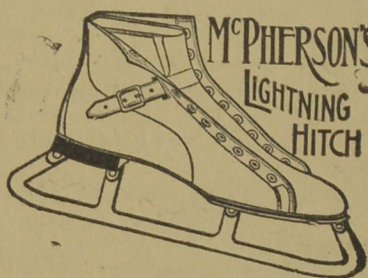
