## MANY PRISONERS WERE TAKEN BY THE ITALIANS

Washington, June 24.—Captures of 45,000 prisoners and enormous stores of war material by the Italians in their counter offensive, which has driven the Austrians across the Piave river, is announced in an official cablegram received today by the Italian embassy from Rome.

Confidence at Rome that the war may be brought to a victorious close this year, if the Allies give the Italians a full measure of support in the offensive which has been launched against the Austrians, is reflected in official wireless despatches from the Italian capital.

These messages say the Austrian retreat across the Piave has become a veritable rout, but information from secret service agents shows that many divisions of German troops have been detached from the front in France and are being rushed to the aid of the Austrian army.

### TAYMOUTH

After a short service at the house the body was conveyed to the Presbyterian Church for Memorial Service. Rev. Mr. Barrass chose his text from the fourteenth chapter of St. John's Gospel, "I Go to Prepare a Place for You." He spoke of the departed having gone to her home which the Saviour had prepared, of how much nearer it would bring Heaven to the bereft ones having a loved one there, of her last words "I have found rest in Jesus", and how she had early found him in life. She was a member of the Baptist Church.

Large numbers followed the body to its last resting place in Taymouth Cemetery showing the high esteem in which she was held.

She had been a very successful both in New Brunswick and the Canadian West. She was married December 6th, 1916 to M. McD. Young, son of John A. Young of Taymouth. The husband sorrows her also a little daughter Christine, aged six months. Her parents Mr. and Mrs. Emery Currie of Douglas, five sisters, Mrs. Alex.
