WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT WAS BROUGHT DOWN

Important Measure in the Interests of the Workingmen Introduced in the Legislature---Is Based on the Report of a Commission Which Studied the Nova Scotia and Ontario Acts.

The House met at 3 o'clock.

MR. BURCHILL presented the report of the Committee on Standing Rules.

The following notices of inquiry were given:

By MR. MURRAY (Kings) as to the quantity of wheat, oats and fertilizer

purchased by the government for the season 1918 and the disposition made of same.

By MR. SUTTON, as to the vacancy in the representation of the county of Carleton; also as to the quantity and price of gasoline purchased dur-

ing 1917; also as to the dismissal of H. B. Durost.

By MR. SMITH (Carleton), as to the number of autos purchased for the different departments of the government and the cost of the same; also as to work on the sub-structure of the highway bridge at East Florenceville.

By MR. TILLEY, as to the number of persons recommended for the position of Chief Game Warden.

HON. MR. ROBINSON presented the petition of the City of Moncton for the passage of an Act authorizing the sale of certain lands.

HON. MR. MURRAY laid on the table the report of the Commission on the Workmen's Compensation Act; also a statement of Consolidated Revenue from October 31st down to March 7th.

HON. MR. ROBINSON presented a petition from J. S. Magee, City Clerk of Moncton, for the passage of a bill to authorize the issuing of debentures; also petitions to amend the Assessment Act, to amend Acts of Assembly incorporating the Town of Moncton, and to fix the valuation for assessment of The Humphreys' Glass Works, Limited.

MR. CROCKET introduced a bill to authorize the City of Fredericton to grant further assistance to The Hart Boot & Shoe Company, Limited; also a bill to fix the valuation for assessment on the properties of the Fraser Companies, Limited.

MR. MICHAUD presented a petition praying for the passage of an Act relating to the Fraser Companies, Limited.

MR. CAMPBELL presented a petition for the passage of an Act relating to St. Paul's church, St. John.

HON. MR. ROBERTS introduced a bill to further amend the St. John City Assessment Act of 1909; also a bill to amend an Act relating to certain short-term debentures of the City of St. John.

Workmen's Compensation.

HON. MR. BYRNE introduced a bill to provide for compensation to workmen for injuries sustained and industrial diseases contracted in the course of their employment. He explained that the bill was brought down in compliance with the promise made in the Speech from the Throne at the opening of the session. The hon. leader of the opposition had referred to it and had expressed the hope that it would be free from politics. He (Byrne) heartily agreed with the sentiments expressed and hoped the measure would be dealt with by the House in a manner free from partisanship. The bill was based largely on the report made by a commission appointed to inquire into the workings of similar acts in Ontario and Nova Scotia. The

chairman of the commission was Mr. F. J. G. Knowlton, a well known St. John lawyer who had associated with him Mr. John B. Cudlip and Mr. Sims, representing the manufacturers, and Mr. Sugrue, representing the Trades & Labor Council, and Mr. Fred Bailey of the Longshoremen's Association. An act had been passed during last session, enlarging the power of the commission and authorizing it to call upon the owners of industrial establishments to provide copies of their payrolls. The commission had taken the evidence of many employers and employees and had submitted a very comprehensive report, which he would recommend all hon. members carefully to peruse.
