QUIET HOME WEDDING BECAUSE OF INFLUENZA

Miss Gladys Grant, Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon A. Grant, Married to John LeLacheur.

A very pretty wedding took place this morning at 11 o'clock when Miss Gladys Grant, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon A. Grant of this city was united in marriage to Mr. John LeLacheur of St. John by the Rev. J. S. Sutherland, pastor of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church. On account of the epidemic of Spanish Influenza which made a church wedding impossible the young couple were married at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Peter McDonald, Regent Street. The wedding was a very quiet one only a few friends and relatives of the bride and groom being present. The bride was unattended.

Mr. LeLacheur is a returned soldier who was wounded in France and has been discharged. Miss Grant was studying music in Germany at the time of the outbreak of the war and after many adventures succeeded in coming home. Both are accomplished vocalists and have appeared more than once at patriotic concerts in Fredericton. They will make their future home in St. John.

The death occurred last night at Fredericton Junction of Miss Eva Nobles, aged twenty-seven years. The funeral will take place tomorrow afternoon interment being made at Fredericton Junction.

Death at Covered Bridge
The death occurred at Covered Bridge last night of Elbridge Fraser, son of Mr. W. A. Fraser, of that place. The deceased was twenty-three years of age. The funeral will take place tomorrow.

Late Allen Lipsett
The funeral of the late Allen Lipsett took place this afternoon from his late home in New Maryland at 2.30 o'clock. Interment was made at the Presbyterian Cemetery, Rev. Mr. Lewis conducting the service.

Seriously Ill at Sackville
A telegram was received by Mrs. J. Gallagher of this city informing her that her daughter Miss Cecil Gallagher who has been teaching in Sackville is seriously ill with the so called Spanish Influenza.

Late Bessie Parsons
The funeral of the late Miss Bessie Parsons took place this afternoon at 2.30 o'clock. The funeral service was conducted by Rev. J. J. Colter of this city. Interment was made at the Rural Cemetery.

Hello-Girls Sick
Nine of the telephone girls are laid up with bad colds and four are on the working staff today. The company is badly in need of girls to help at the exchange, Carleton Street. The public should show patience if they can not get a number immediately.

Lively Runaway
At Phoenix Square this morning a horse becoming excited made a dash away from the market and swerved around making out York Street and turning up King Street. The horse was captured before much damage was done.

Mail for Siberia and North Russia
The Post Office Department has not yet been able to complete arrangements for the forwarding to Siberia of mail for the Canadian Forces intending to operate in Siberia. Mail, including parcels for the Canadian Forces in North Russia, may be forwarded via England.

Convention Postponed
The seventy-first annual convention of the Baptists of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, which was slated to begin on next Saturday in Woodstock, N. B., has, of course been cancelled because of the government action with regard to the prevalence of influenza-pneumonia. This cancellation is one of the most important of postponements brought about by the government's drastic action, and plans are in progress to amend matters. If the ban against public meetings is continued for more than three weeks a representative committee probably will do the work of the convention.

FIFTY-TWO INFLUENZA CASES ARE REPORTED

TOTAL IN THE CITY FOUR TIMES THAT NUMBER

Spitting in Streets is to be Stopped—Military Medical Officers Wanted for Epidemic.

In accordance with instructions issued by the Board of Health of Fredericton the physicians of the city are beginning to make reports of the cases of influenza which they are attending. Up to noon today Secretary Dibblee of the Board had received reports of fifty-two cases with a number of doctors yet to report. All these cases however are not the so called Spanish Influenza. There is little doubt however that that number can be multiplied by four to get the total number of cases of influenza in Fredericton.

In Neighboring Places
Neighboring places also are severely affected by the disease. Devon, Barker's Point and Marysville all have numerous cases. From Manguerville today the report was that that section seemed to have escaped the epidemic to quite an extent.

To Stop Spitting in Streets
The bylaw prohibiting spitting in the streets and public buildings which has been rather a dead letter for some years is to be rigidly enforced, the police having received particular instructions with regard to the matter.

Military Medical Officers
An effort is being made to have a military medical officer detailed for duty in Stanley and vicinity. Capt. Alder L. Gerow, C. A. M. C., of this city has been instructed to proceed to Albert County in connection with the outbreak there.

In the Lumber Camps
The influenza has made great inroads in the lumber camps. In the vicinity of Napudogan some camps have suspended operations. Everett Nowlan of Sunny Corner, Northumberland County, who had been working at Buckley's camp near Napudogan died on the train on his way home.

Nurses for Sunbury
It is reported that the Department of Public Health will endeavor to secure the services of trained nurses for Sunbury County the southern sections of which are severely scourged by the disease.

Mid-Week Market
Only a small number of teams was assembled at Phoenix Square this morning. Meat and vegetables were the prevailing produce. Apples were plentiful and sold for \$1.50 to \$2.00 a half barrel. Turnips brought \$1.25 a barrel and carrots \$1.25 a half barrel. Butter brought 50 cents a pound. Lamb sold for \$1.75 to \$2.50 a quarter. There were no eggs on sale.

SEVERAL MORE CASUALTIES ARE MADE KNOWN

EARL J. KITCHEN IN A HOSPITAL FROM GAS

Ernest Horncastle Wounded a Second Time—Ralph Barton, of Devon, Reported Wounded.

Today's casualty list includes the names of four local young men. Private Stanley Young is reported seriously ill with gunshot wounds. Private Earl J. Kitchen has been gassed and is now in England recovering. Private Ernest Horncastle was admitted to hospital with gunshot wounds on October 4th. Private Ralph Barton of Devon has also been admitted to hospital suffering from a gunshot wound.

Wounded in Three Places
Mr. and Mrs. Charles D. Young received a telegram yesterday morning stating that her son Private Stanley Young was admitted to No. 22 Casualty Clearing Station on October 10, seriously ill with gunshot wounds. A second telegram was received this morning stating that Private Young was admitted to No 14 General Hospital Wimereux with gunshot wounds in the neck, shoulder and arm.

Private Earl J. Kitchen
Mrs. Coles Kitchen has received news that her son Private Earl Kitchen was gassed and admitted to a base hospital in France on September 17th. A letter has been received from Private Kitchen dated September 30th. He states that he had been moved to England on September 23rd and had recovered sufficiently to be able to write. Private Kitchen enlisted and left here with the 24th Field Battery. On reaching England he went right over to France and was for some time with the Field Post Office. He was transferred again and was serving with an Ambulance Corps at the time of being gassed.

Private Ernest Horncastle
Mr. Harry Horncastle received news this morning that his son Ernest Horncastle was admitted to No 22 General Hospital at Camiers on October 4th suffering from gunshot wounds in the left leg. Private Horncastle was in the casualty list about a year ago but returned to duty again. He enlisted here with the 104th Battalion in 1916.

Private Ralph Barton
News was received this morning that Private Ralph Barton was admitted to Hospital on October 4th suffering from gunshot wounds in the arm. Private Barton enlisted here and went overseas with the 236th Battalion. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Barton of Devon.
