These interests thought that St. John would be a fertile recruiting ground and the drive was made last night. So great did the crowd become in front of his residence that the police had to regulate the stream of applicants, with the result that two members of the local police force themselves signed contracts for work in British Columbia. The party will leave for the Pacific province on Tuesday.

VETERANS WILL ATTEND SERVICE NEXT SUNDAY

**SPECIAL ADDRESS BY
REV. GEORGE M. YOUNG**

**Patriotic and Military Bodies
Invited to Attend—Day of
Intercession and Com-
memoration.**

The Fredericton Branch of the Great War Veterans' Association has signified its intention of attending divine service at the Fredericton Methodist Church on the morning of Sunday next, August 4th, the fourth anniversary of the beginning of the Great War. Rev. George M. Young, pastor of the church will be the preacher and will deliver a special address upon The War and the Gains Already Obtained from It. In view of the fact that the G. W. V. A. already has decided to attend service there an invitation has been extended to all other patriotic and military bodies also to attend the services at the Methodist Church, and it is expected that a large number will accept. There will be band music for the march to and from the church. As the number of veterans has greatly increased lately it is expected that several hundreds will be in attendance.

Services of Intercession

In accordance with the proclamations of His Excellency the Governor General and His Honor the Lieut. Governor Sunday next will be generally observed in the churches as a day of intercession and commemoration of the beginning of the war.

At the Cathedral

At Christchurch Cathedral the services of intercession will be in charge of Rev. Mr. Bate the curate, the Very Rev. Dean Neales beginning his vacation on Thursday next.

Derrick Replaced

A large wrecking crane, owned by the Canadian Pacific Railway, was brought from McAdam early Sunday morning, and succeeded in placing on the track the crane of the Canadian Bridge Co., which upset and rolled down the embankment last Tuesday afternoon, at the scene of the new of the Nepesic River, Westfield. The bridge being put in place at the mouth Bridge Co's crane was found to be not very badly damaged and will probably be in working order again by the end of this week. A temporary trestle has again been erected across the gap, and will be finished by tonight. This will enable the construction work of the Valley Railway to proceed until the new bridge is placed.

STIFF SENTENCE GIVEN MAN FOR RESISTING

**HERBERT FERRIS GOT
INTO TROUBLE IN DEVON**

**Refused to Pay Bill and As-
saulted Constable When
Arrested—One Year
with \$100 Fine.**

Herbert Ferris of St. John was given a heavy sentence in the Fredericton police court this morning for assaulting a constable while the latter was discharging his duty. The sentence was one year in jail with a fine of one hundred dollars on the expiration of that sentence in the default of the payment of which there will be an extension of one year to the sentence.

Violent Resistance

Ferris formerly lived in this vicinity and contracted a large bill with P. S. Watson, a merchant of Devon. The creditor learning that Ferris was in Devon took out a capias for him and Constable Charles Barker was given the paper to serve. Ferris was located at a residence in Devon yesterday and after service had been performed refused to pay the bill and informed the constable that the latter could not take him. Constable Barker then proceeded to make the arrest and Ferris resisted biting the constable in the shoulder Murray Quartermain was called upon to assist the officer and the prisoner was finally placed in Quartermain's light wagon and driven away. Although he had a twister on him he continued to resist and finally kicked Quartermain out of the wagon causing the horse to run away. He then devoted his attention to the constable in spite of the fact that both himself and the officer were in danger of their lives. In turning a corner the wagon was upset and both were thrown out. Constable Barker being rendered unconscious and being severely cut about the face and head. He was taken to Dr. B. M. Mullin's office where medical assistance was given him.

Finally Arrested

In the meantime Quartermain had followed up the prisoner who had got away and attempted to hire an auto and leave town. In the meantime word was sent to Fredericton and Chief Finley went to Devon and got the prisoner.
