EXPRESSION
OF THE LOYALTY
OF QUEBEC

Ottawa, Jan. 2.—The Governor General has forwarded to the King the following message received from Hon. P. E. LeBlanc, Lieutenant-Governor of Quebec:

Quebec, December 31.
Dear Sir,—I have the honor respectfully to request Your Excellency to convey to His Majesty the King, on behalf of myself, of my cabinet ministers, and of all the inhabitants of the Province of Quebec, the expression of our devoted attachment and loyalty to His Majesty's person and throne on our earnest wishes for a happy New Year for their majesties the King and Queen and members of the Royal Family, and all His Majesty's subjects. On this fourth recurrence during the war of New Year's Day, I pledge our province once more to a continued and determined participation in the struggle for that decisive victory which will insure to the world the blessing of a righteous and abiding peace. For this we fight and pray, humbly imploring the Great Ruler of the Universe that if it be His will, this victorious peace may come before the end of the coming year, the happiest of His Majesty's reign, which will thus be as we pray it may, P. E. LEBLANC.

TO PUT GOTHAM
ON WAR BASIS

New York, Jan. 2.—The government of New York city must be placed on a "war basis," the new mayor, John F. Hylan, told the newly appointed heads of departments in his inaugural address assuming office yesterday.

This must be brought about, he said, through the elimination of useless positions, the enforcement of a policy of strict economy and conservation of the public funds in every possible way.

SIGNOR MARCONI
HEADS MISSION

Rome, Jan. 2.—Signor G. Marconi, who has been appointed head of the Italian permanent mission in the United States, made the following remarks today in addressing the Senate on Italian and American relations:

"The Italian mission to the United States again realized during its journey the great friendship and sympathy existing there for us. We must consider the spontaneous intervention in the war with special satisfaction."
