QUEBEC MEN
ARE RALLYING
TO SERVICE

Quebec.—All trains reaching the city are daily bringing young men of military age, who are responding to the call to report for service. Answering the 600 daily orders to report issued lately, draftees are coming in from all parts of the district, some of them a day or two late, but generally on time to comply with the instructions received. This morning about one hundred came in from the Eastern townships region by the Grand Trunk early train, while the Quebec Central brought in a good quota last evening.

Following recommendations made by General Landry, G.O.C., some time ago, the draftees are called by parish as much as possible, Bromptonville, Windsor Mills, Richmond, Sherbrooke, Danville, Arthabaska, Victoriaville, Chaudiere, St. Romuald, have sent each about 75 draftees during the week. Down the river the call has not yet been so pressing, but Riviere du Loup, Kamouraska, Montmagny, Lislet, etc., have also a very large percentage under colors.

Requests for leave of absence for farming purposes are numerous, but are being granted only in extreme cases by the board, which is presided over by Captain Couillard, formerly public representative.

SUBSTITUTES
REGULATION
IS DEFERRED

Ottawa, July 15—Because of the limited supplies of substitutes for wheat flour at present available in Canada, in comparison to the demand which would result from the operation of the recent order of the Canada Food Board requiring the use of substitutes in certain proportions by bakers, confectioners, public eating places, and private households, the Canada Food Board has deferred, until a date to be fixed, the operation of certain sections of that order.

Bakers, confectioners, public eating places and private households will not, for the present, have to use one pound of substitutes to every four pounds of wheat flour in baking. They must, however, use one pound of substitutes to every nine pounds of wheat flour, as provided in the law now operative. Dealers in eastern Canada, as well as in Western Canada, for the present will be required to sell one pound of substitutes with only every four pounds of standard flour.

LIQUOR LAWS
WERE SEVERE

According to the Halifax Recorder the following Order-in-Council was passed by the government of Nova Scotia with respect to the liquor traffic, on October 11th, 1750: "That the penalty on all persons convicted before the Governor and Council of retailing spirituous liquors without license within this settlement, be from this time forward as follows, viz.: That the offender pay £10 sterling; one-half to the informer and the other half to the poor of the settlement—and be publicly whipped thirty stripes—and that in case of the offender's refusing or neglecting to pay the said sum of £10, he or she be committed to His Majesty's gaol, and there to remain the term of three months, and that a proclamation be issued to inform all persons hereof."

SETTING ASIDE
THE MORAL CODE
TOO READILY

Numerous examples have been noted of late of the fact that the human mind easily finds excuses for almost anything that human desire, passion, or self-interest seems to demand. A young woman on trial for killing another woman with whose husband she was infatuated, set up this paragraph in her code of morals:

"The passing of a husband's affection for his wife is a sufficient annulment of any marriage vow."

This easy way along the path of dalliance will hardly take the place of the Seventh Commandment in the world's conscience. Such personal moral codes are pretty sure to have results disastrous to everybody concerned. To many persons consider, without much thought, that the old moral law of which the Ten Commandments are the expression, was somehow set up in a long past age to interfere with their pleasures. This is a fatal assumption. The Commandments are the expression of fundamental truth. Their violation does great harm to the violator, because he is going against the fundamental laws of his own nature.

Germany has of late years set aside another of the Commandments, "Thou shalt not steal." It has placed the demands of the state above the moral law. The state is held supreme.

It is safe to say that this new Germanic moral code will work out badly in the long run. The mills of the gods grind slowly, but they keep everlastingly at it. National moral codes have no more standing at the bar of fundamental spiritual law than do individual moral codes. A nation is no more exempt from the eternal justice than an individual.

In the great movement of the race onward "it needs must be that offenses come." But the old warning remains in all its force, and will remain "but woe unto him by whom they come."

Love is like a wave. Try to dodge it and it will bowl you over; dash right into it and you may come out on the other side safe and sane—or you may not.

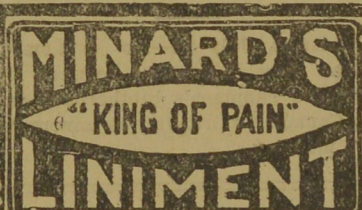
