

KING GEORGE'S MESSAGE TO UNITED STATES

London, Nov. 13—King George on the signing of the armistice sent a message of congratulation to President Wilson and of thanks to the people of the United States for their aid in the war. President Wilson replied expressing warm appreciation. The King's message follows:

"At this moment of universal gladness, I send you, Mr. President and the people of your great republic, a message of congratulation and deep thanks in my own name and that of the people of this empire.

"It is indeed a matter of solemn thanksgiving that the peoples of our two countries, akin in spirit as in speech, should today be united in this greatest of democratic achievements.

"I thank you and the people of the United States for the high and noble part which you have played in this glorious chapter of history and freedom."

President's Reply

President Wilson's cablegram to King George follows:

"Your generous and gracious message is most warmly appreciated and you may rest assured that our hearts on this side of the Atlantic are the more completely filled with joy and satisfaction because we know the greater partnership of interests and of sentiments to which we belong.

"We are happy to be associated in this time of triumph with the government and people upon whom we are so sure we can count for cooperation in the delicate and difficult tasks which remain to be performed in order that the high purposes of the

REALIZED DEFEAT SOME TIME AGO

(New York Sun)

The best element in Germany realized a month ago that defeat was certain and that their only hope was to get the best possible terms of peace, said Major Henry Crosby Emery, who reached an Atlantic port yesterday.

Major Emery was taken prisoner by the Germans on the Aland Islands in March while on a mission for the Guaranty Trust Company to investigate conditions in Russia. He was kept a prisoner in Danzig and in Berlin and on Oct. 22, was granted permission by the Germans to leave for Copenhagen.

"When I left Germany," he said, "the Germans had thoroughly made up their minds that they were defeated and the talk of the abdication of the Kaiser was the constant gossip in the best clubs and hotels.

"They realized that the best terms would be to accept President Wilson's fourteen points of peace."

Major Emery added that conditions were quiet when he left Berlin, but he feared that the Bolshevik factions would get into control and that a disastrous period of disorder might ensue.

The intelligent classes of Germany he continued have reconciled themselves to the giving up of Alsace-Lorraine and a part of Poland and to the return and restoration of Belgium and the payment of large indemnities.

THEIR WORK SATISFACTORY

The Allied War Council which met at Versailles, France, and prepared the armistice for Germany was composed of the following: Premier Lloyd George, Premier Clemenceau, General Pershing, Col. E. M. House, Sir Douglas Haig, General Foch, General Bliss, Premier Orlando, Sir Eric Geddes, Admiral Benson and Admiral Sims. Their work seems to have given universal satisfaction to the Allied peoples.
