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### A SPLENDID INVESTMENT.

The campaign for the Victory Loan will be brought to a close tomorrow night, and those who have not yet made their purchases should lose no time in doing so. The great war is over, and the Victory won, but an enormous expenditure has still got to be made. The sum of half a billion dollars is being called for by the Federal government and every dollar of it is urgently needed. To those who have money available but hesitate to invest it in Victory bonds we commend the following statement lately issued by Hon. F. B. McCurdy, M. P., who is a recognized financial authority:

"Anyone who regards his action in investing in Canada's Victory Loan at 5½ per cent. as a patriotic duty, duly performed, can take what meed of pleasure he may from such contemplation. It is all to the good, and anyway, he will never regret his purchase.

"The present generation of Canadians have never had an opportunity of investing in government bonds at all comparable with the present war loans. To find a parallel on this continent one has to go back to the American civil war. Then, as now, large emissions of United States government loans for war necessities flooded the market, and resulted, in that country's bonds being sold at low prices. After the end of the war, of course, they went up.

"The present Victory Loan is being offered on more favorable terms to the purchasers than its predecessors in that now peace is in sight and with it the conditions will bring fresh accumulation of capital and higher market prices for government bonds.

"Only a few years ago even 4 per cent. bonds of small cities and towns sold at par. Does anyone doubt that, after peace comes, similar bond market conditions will return?"

Tomorrow will wind up the Victory Loan campaign. There should be a big drive; all should put their shoulders to the wheel and put York and Sunbury counties well beyond their objective.

### WAR AND MATRIMONY.

That hundreds of American soldiers are marrying in France has been reported by Charles Edward Russell after a recent trip to Europe. Of course our soldiers can't be blamed, says the New York Sun. French women are renowned for their beauty and charm. These however are not the only influences; there are time when nostalgia may demand more than friendship, and it was with this in mind that Julius Rosenwald was sent to represent the American War Department in France. He had power to circulate among the troops, telling them of conditions at home, particularly of the opportunities in American life as he had observed them in his own successful business career. Mr. Russell's visit came as a sequel. Speaking of American soldiers who are marrying in France, he says:

"The majority of them will probably settle there after the war. France welcomes them because she has lost so many young men in the conflict. It is the custom and has been for generations among business men that when their time for retirement comes they turn over their business to the son; and in the case where there is no son, or when he has been killed in battle, the business is turned over to the son-in-law. Frenchmen who will not be able to marry their daughters to their own countrymen are glad to get intelligent young Americans as members of their families."

Representatives of nine Protestant denominations have accepted an invitation of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America to meet in Philadelphia, December 3 to 6, to consider a proposal of the Presbyterian General Assembly for "organic union of the evangelical churches in America," it was announced last night. The denominations which will be re-

presented at the conference are the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States, the Reformed Church in the United States, the United Presbyterian Church of North America, the Methodist Episcopal Church, Congregational Church, the Disciples of Christ, the Evangelical Synod of North America and the Moravian Church in America.

New Brunswick subscriptions to the Victory Loan up to yesterday had reached \$11,328,600. Our objective is \$13,000,000, and if every man does his duty during the closing hours of the campaign the goal will be reached and passed.

Mr. Andrew Bonar Law announced yesterday that a proclamation summoning a new parliament would be issued on November 25th. Nominations will be made on December 4th and polling will take place one week later.

The death occurred at Victoria Mill this morning of Harold Blizzard, after a lingering illness of pneumonia. The father of the deceased Lemuel Blizzard died a few days ago from the same disease. The deceased child was three years of age and is survived by his mother and one brother Royden. The funeral took place this afternoon interment being made at the Forest Hill Cemetery. Rev. Canon Cowie conducted the service. This is the twenty-fifth death from pneumonia in this city since the outbreak of the epidemic of influenza.
