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HUNS ARE GETTING OUT OF FRANCE AND BELGIUM

The Allied Troops are Marching in the Direction of Metz and Strassburg—Marshal Foch Will Make Solemn Entry Into German Fortresses on Sunday—The Liberation of Belgium Promises to be Speedy—Peace Conference May be Held at Versailles.

Paris, Nov. 14—Germany's troops began to evacuate France and Belgium on Tuesday. The Allied troops then moved forward, the Americans advancing in the direction of Metz and Strassburg.

Marshal Foch, commander-in-chief of the Allied armies, will make solemn entries into those German fortresses on Sunday in the presence of President Poincaré and Premier Clemenceau. The marshal will ride into the cities on Croesus, his favorite charger.

It is probable that the departments in the re-won territory will resume their old names; Prefecture of Strassburg; Haut Rhine Prefecture of Colmar and Moselle, Prefecture of Metz. The government is already considering the establishment of provisional administrative arrangements.

The occupation of the territory on the left bank of the Rhine and the bridgeheads will not be undertaken by the Allied forces until later.

Probably Speedy

The liberation of Belgium promises to be rapidly accomplished. On the occasion of the re-entry of the Belgians sovereigns into Brussels the French government has decided to present to the queen the grand cordon of the Legion of Honor and to the heir apparent the Chevalier's Cross and the Cross of War.

In conformity with the agreement reached between Marshal Foch and the German delegates, a period of five days has been allowed to the enemy in which to hand over all the armament material stipulated in the armistice.

The French command asked the Germans for information as to where mines have been laid and was informed that some had been placed in the Ostend Station and timed to explode yesterday. The German command accordingly was asked to send officers to locate the explosives.

An additional day, making fifteen days in all from the date of the armistice, has been granted to the enemy to evacuate Belgium, Luxembourg, Alsace and Lorraine.

Marshal Foch has directed the Germans to send officers to the king of the Belgians at Bruges to give information regarding the German Luxembourg railroad and canal systems and the navigation of the Rhine.

The Germans today are sending an officer to Chimay, to arrange with French officers for the handing over of the arms and material which Germany has to surrender.

The Peace Conference

Paris, Nov. 14—The general feeling of the associated governments is that Versailles is the most convenient place to hold the peace conference and if this were decided upon it also would serve as a recognition of the paramount position of France in the war.

In addition to these considerations there are certain practical ones of telegraph and cable facilities and easy communication with Paris, and the ample living accommodations as compared with those in the smaller Holland and Switzerland cities.

Agents of the various allied countries already are seeking large houses in Paris for their delegations. The American representation will move from

the small residence which Colonel House and his staff now occupy to one much larger.

Paris, Nov. 14—It is probable that the first meeting of the peace conference will be on a date before December 15, after the English parliamentary elections and at a time which will give ample opportunity for the American and other delegates to arrive. A meeting of the inter-Allied conference soon to be held will finally determine the details of these questions.

Premier David Lloyd George and Foreign Minister Balfour of Great Britain, Premier Orlando and Foreign Minister Sonnino of Italy, Premier Venizelos of Greece, and Foreign Minister Pachitch of Serbia, are on their way here for a resumption of the conferences at the home of Colonel Edward M. House, special representative of the United States government.

Besides outlining the general programme, the question of meeting the food situation in Germany and Austria probably will be considered.

Late Earle LeBaron Swim

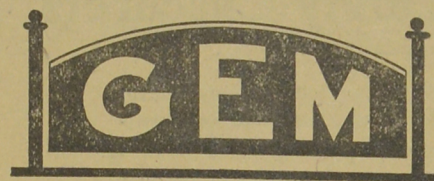

When the Breeders' Livestock Consignment Sale takes place they will be sold for delivery at a later date on the lifting of quarantine. Another carload of sheep arrived last night. The Provincial Department of Agriculture expects to have all deliveries of sheep made by December 1st and the business of sheep-importation cleared up.
