

JOHN PARSONS DIED OF WOUNDS IN FRANCE MAY 5

HIS BROTHER WILLIAM
KILLED NINE MONTHS AGO

Was Serving With New Brunswick Infantry Unit—Son of Sergt. John Parsons of Military Police.

Mrs. John Parsons, 559 Brunswick street, was informed this morning officially that her son, Private John Parsons, had died of wounds in France on May 5th. The deceased is the second member of the family to give his life in France, Lance Corp. William Parsons, formerly Company Sergt. Major in the 104th Battalion, having been killed in action nine months ago yesterday. Another brother, Edward, is serving in France. The father of the three boys is Sergt. John Parsons of the Military Police of No. 7 Military District, who himself went overseas with the 104th Battalion. The deceased was with a New Brunswick infantry unit.

Besides his parents and the brother named, the young soldier leaves to mourn their loss three sisters and two brothers. They are Mrs. Frank Brown, the Misses Bessie and Dorothy, and Messrs. Alden and Robert.

The deceased at the time of enlistment was employed with McManus & Co. in this city, having been with that firm for some years.

Lt. Burdette W. Harmon Missing.

Word was received here yesterday afternoon that Flight Lieut. Burdette W. Harmon of the Royal Flying Corps is reported missing. The young officer belongs to Woodstock. He was on leave in this province last winter and during that time was married to Miss Harriet A. Hanselacker, now of Stanley. Word was sent to his wife last evening. Both Lieut. Harmon and his wife are U.N.B. graduates. The young officer enlisted in the Canadian Engineers at the first of the war and served with them, the Canadian Infantry and the R.F.C. He was wounded and was awarded the Military Medal, the Military Cross and a Russian decoration. He is a brother of Mrs. P. R. Hayward, formerly of Fairville.

She stated that it was her intention to go to France in June to take charge of a stationary canteen. The speaker was tendered a hearty vote of thanks at the close of her address.

SENATE OF UNIVERSITY OF NEW BRUNSWICK HELD ENCAENIAL MEETING AT EDUCATION OFFICE

Year's Leave of Absence Given Prof. R. B. Miller and Prof. Aldrich—Standing Committee to Consider Matter of Filling Vacancies—Proposal to Add Entomology and Plant Pathology to Science Course—Historical Sketch May Be Published—Alumni Society Met Last Night—A. S. McFarlane, M. A., Elected President—Library Building Proposed at War Memorial—Alumnae Also Met.

The Senate of the University of New Brunswick held its encaenial meeting at the Education Office this morning with a large attendance. The report of the examiners for degrees was received and adopted. Honorary degrees which were recommended were the degree of LL. D. for Hon. William Pugsley, Lieut. Governor of the province, and the degree of M.A. for Mr. W. McL. Barker of Moncton, a member of the staff of Moncton High school.

To Allow Term.

The recommendation that students in good standing be granted the present university term on enlistment was adopted.

May Extend Course.

The proposal to extend the science course of the university so as to include entomology and plant pathology was referred to a committee which will take the matter up with the Provincial Department of Agriculture.

Leave of Absence.

The request of Prof. Miller, Dean of the Forestry School, for one year's leave of absence was granted. The matter of filling this vacancy and that caused by the year's leave of absence given Prof. Aldrich will be left to a committee composed of the president of the Senate, Dr. W. S. Carter and the chancellor of the University, Dr. C. C. Jones.

Historical Sketch.

A committee with Dr. Thomas Walker of St. John, as chairman, was appointed to take up the matter of the publication of a manuscript prepared by Venerable Archdeacon Raymond under the title of "The Genesis of the University of New Brunswick," which deals with the history of the early days of the institution. The Associated Alumni have offered to co-operate in the publication of this paper.

To Continue Military Drill.

It was decided to continue military drill at the university under the direction of Professor Cameron.

Associated Alumni.

The annual meeting of the Associated Alumni of the University of New Brunswick was held in the Provincial Normal School Building here last night. There was a large attendance which represented graduating classes from 1859 to recent years. Dr. Thomas Walker of St. John, was the senior member present, being one of the last to be graduated by King's College, Fredericton, before the institution was given its present title.

The report of the examiners for the Alumni Gold Medal for translation of English prose into Latin was that the medal had been won by Miss Frances Louise Scott of Fredericton, a member of the graduating class, who also is the winner of the Montgomery Campbell prize for fourth year Latin and Greek.

No award was made in the case of the Brydone-Jack Scholarship, there being no recommendation from the professor in the department in which the scholarship is awarded, third year physics.

Eighteen new members were admitted to membership in the society, which was reported to be in a flourishing condition.

Important Suggestion.

There was a long discussion on the question of the preservation of the archives of the university. Dr. W. S. Carter reported that he had some in the vault of the Education office. Chancellor Jones stated that he also had some but not in a place safe from fire. He made the important suggestion that a memorial to those Alumni fallen in the present war take the form of a library building with fireproof vaults in connection and if possible an endowment for a permanent librarian.

Alumnae Society.

The annual meeting of the Alumnae Society of the University of New Brunswick was held last night at the residence of Mrs. H. F. McLeod, with the president, Mrs. C. McN. Steeves, in the chair. The officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: President, Miss E. Hunter; vice presidents, Miss E. Hazen Allen and Miss Louise Kinghorn; secretary-treasurer, Miss Grace Fleming; assistant secretary, Mrs. John E. Page; members of the council, Mrs. C. McN. Steeves, M.A., H. G. Chestnut, Mrs. H. F. McLeod, Miss Beatrice Jewett, Miss Mary Williamson.

The scholarship which is given annually by the Society was tied for by Miss Edith G. McLeod of Fredericton and Miss M. Louise Friel of Moncton. It was decided to give each competitor \$20 instead of the scholarship which amounts to \$30.

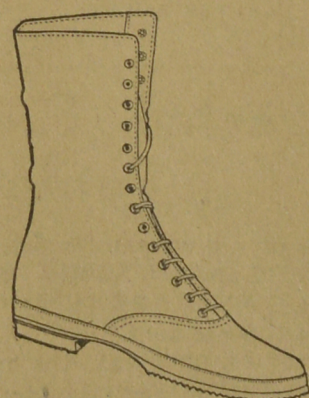
