While the esteemed Ex-Alderman is well up in years somehow or other his fellow citizens have not yet come to regard him as an old man in the ordinary sense of the term, and those outside of his intimate friends will no doubt be astonished to learn

ream for taxes, even before the City Treasurer had served him with the customary notice.

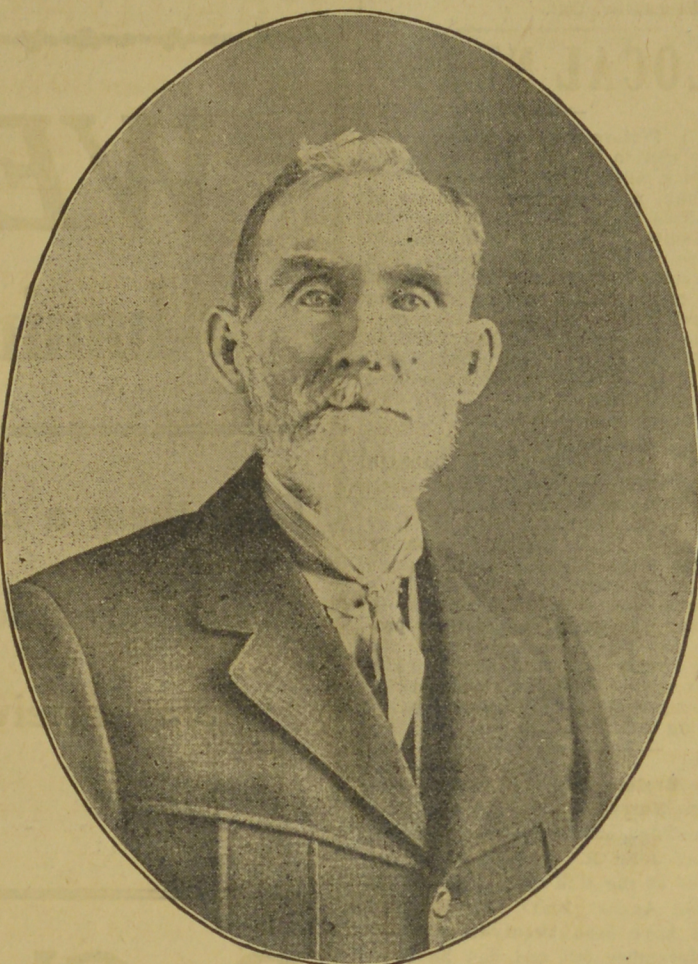
His Hospital Gift
Only a short time before he arranged to place at the disposal of the trustees of the Victoria Public Hospital the magnificent sum of \$10,000 to defray the cost of equipping the new hospital building to be erected by the executive of the estate of the late Donald Fraser. He did not make any noise about it either, but simply informed the trustees that he was ready to place the above mentioned sum at their disposal for the equipment of the proposed new building and that there would be no strings to the gift. It is a most generous offer worthy in every way of this unostentatious big hearted man, who glories in the fact that he is one of the common people.

A Plain Blunt Man

It may be said of Mr. Moore that although he is one of Fredericton's wealthiest citizens he never put on any frills or allowed his money to run away with his brains. Indeed it will be generally admitted that he has kept his head all through the piece. With his exceedingly capable and devoted wife he shares a beautiful home where they have every comfort but without indulging in foolish extravagance. Mr. Moore is fond of horses, and at his stable is to be found one of the nicest looking, and best groomed drivers in the city. He owned an automobile for a short time but he was not impressed with that method of locomotion, and getting rid of it he went back to the time honored horse and carriage. On every week day, winter or summer, when his health permits he takes a drive about the streets. He visits the market, calls on his solicitor and occasionally makes a pilgrimage to some point in Sunbury County. He takes the greatest delight in meeting old friends and acquaintances and exchanging greetings and cracking jokes with them.

A Severe Handicap

Mr. Moore has had to make his way through life without the advantage of even a common school education. His parents were poor and in his young days he had to work and work hard for a living. Knowing the handicap under which he had always labored his friends marvel at the remarkable astuteness, ability and foresight he has constantly displayed in matters

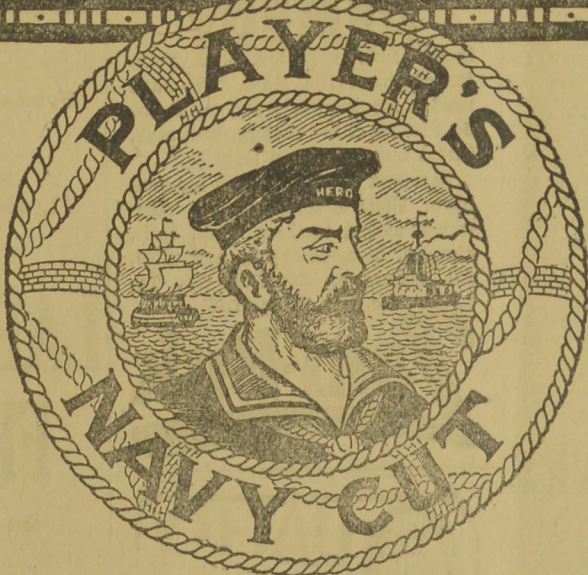

of business; it is doubtful if a parallel case can be found in all Canada. His friends used to say that a man who could get ahead of Edward Moore in a business transaction were entitled to all they got and this is as true today as it was twenty-five years ago.

The older citizens will recall how on one occasion a crafty bank manager tried to put one over on Mr. Moore to the tune of thousands of dollars, and came off second best. Mr. Moore got his money back and the banker went down and out and never came back. Mr. Moore's business transactions, large and small, have always been characterized by the most sterling honesty and fair dealing; in fact that sort of thing seems to be a second nature to him. He takes pride in settling his bills promptly and no one can say that he ever wrongfully obtained as much as a five cent piece. Any city or town that numbers among its citizens one or more men as public spirited and true hearted as Mr. Edward Moore can very well consider itself specially favored.

Native of Sunbury

Mr. Moore is not a native of Fredericton, but he has made his home here for a period of twenty-seven years. He was born in the Parish of Burton, Sunbury County, but afterwards the family removed to Fredericton Junction and Mr. Moore continued to reside there until his removal to Fredericton in the early nineties. His mother belonged to one of the best families in the north of Ireland and upon the death of her brother there some thirty years ago, she as his next of kin inherited a large estate which included extensive linen mills at Belfast. Mr. Moore was delegated by his mother to journey to Belfast to look after her interests and made the trip in company with his brother. He carried with him the necessary proofs, and before he returned home he saw to the transfer of the property. His mother passed away a few years later at a ripe old age and the property was
