## REPORT OF U.N.B. SENATE ON RECENT INVESTIGATION

R. H. Bennett, a Senior Student Admitted He Was the Author of a Monthly Editorial Attacking Members of the Faculty  
---Matheson's Poem got him into trouble  
---Discipline at the University of New Brunswick Must be Maintained.

The following is the report of the special committee of the U.N.B. senate, composed of Sir Ezekiel McLeod, Chief Justice Hazen and Mr. Justice Barry, appointed to consider the matter of certain articles published in the University Monthly of December, which reflected upon Chancellor Jones and other members of the faculty of the University:

Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 27, 1918. To the President and Senate of the University of New Brunswick. The Committee appointed this day to investigate the responsibility of certain articles that appear in the University Monthly for December, 1917, and to make such suggestions regarding the same as they might deem best, submit the following report:

Immediately after the adjournment of the meeting of the senate this morning, they met and selected Sir Ezekiel McLeod as chairman.

The editors of the University Monthly appeared before the committee and made statements to them. It appeared that the editors for the month were:

R. H. Bennett,  
M. B. Dunn,  
J. F. McIntosh,

and that the other editors whose names appear in the Monthly dealt with special matters such as athletics, personals, exchanges, etc., and had no responsibility whatever for the articles which were objected to and were considered by the senate and committee.

It further appeared that while Messrs. Bennett, Dunn and McIntosh were editors for the year, they each took a month in turn, during which they supervised the Monthly and were responsible for what appeared in its columns and that during the month of December Mr. Bennett was the responsible editor and Messrs. Dunn and McIntosh had little, if anything, to do with what was published in its columns.

It appeared from Mr. Bennett's own statement that he was the author of the leading article entitled "Editorial Comment"; that he also wrote the article signed "N. C. O." and headed "The Follies of Social Life," though in this connection he stated that the greater part of that article was copied from an old publication and that the latter part was original with him.

He also stated that he was not the author of the article entitled, "Keep the Ball Rolling," and signed "Overseas," but he knew who wrote it and that the author was not at present at the University. He objected, however, to giving the writer's name and as he said that the name was disclosed to him in confidence, the members of your committee did not urge him to do so. He stated that the writer had not yet graduated from the University. He also stated that he had seen and read the article before it was published.

Both Messrs. Dunn and McIntosh said that they knew nothing about these articles until they appeared in the Monthly.

In view of these statements and admissions made by Mr. Bennett, your committee have come to the conclusion that he was responsible for the publication of the three articles mentioned; was the writer of the article headed "Editorial Comment"; and wrote a portion of the article signed "N. C. O." and entitled "The Follies of Social Life"; and was entirely responsible for the publication of the remainder of it which, as stated before, he said was copied from another publication of many years ago.

It also appeared that the verses headed "Carmen," containing references of an objectionable character to members of the faculty, describing them by meaningless nicknames, were written by Cecil M. Matheson, a student of the sophomore class. Mr. Matheson stated that he had written these during the holidays for his own amusement and not for the purpose of publication; that he gave copies to different students, not intending at the time that they should be published, otherwise than by the circulation thus given; that before the Monthly was published in December, he was aware of the intention of the management to publish them, but that he did not know by whom they were given to the editor; that he took no steps to prevent their being published.

Every opportunity was afforded to the students concerned to make full statements regarding the matter and to offer any remarks in justification or defense of their conduct and they were also informed that your committee were prepared to hear any other students whom they thought desirable to call. The editors did not avail themselves of this latter permission.

In view of the character of the articles that were published, which were not only most unfair to the members of the faculty, but which were, in several instances, absolutely untrue, and in view of the injury which their publication must of necessity do to the University unless the authors are promptly dealt with, your committee are of opinion and so recommend that R. H. Bennett be expelled from the University. They make this recommendation with feelings of deep regret, but believe that no lesser punishment would be adequate in view of the serious nature of the offense.

Your committee further recommend that in the case of Cecil M. Matheson, he be suspended from attending lectures at the University for the balance of the present academic year but that he be permitted to attend any supplementary examinations that are held during the present week.

Your committee submit herewith a stenographic report of the proceedings, including statements of the students who appeared before them and copies of the letters that were produced, also copy of the University Monthly of December last.

In view of the fact that there has been considerable criticism of the action of the faculty last autumn in reducing the fine imposed upon certain students from twenty-five dollars to five dollars, the senate decided to publish the following declaration signed by all the students involved, and which in the opinion of the senate, quite justly influenced the faculty's action in the matter:

To the Chancellor and Faculty of the University of New Brunswick.

The undersigned undergraduates of the University of New Brunswick submit the following for your consideration:

(1) We regret that we took part in the initiation of the freshman class on the twenty-seventh of September last against the will of the faculty;

(2) We recognize the undoubted authority of the faculty to regulate the discipline of the University, and we pledge ourselves on our honor to desist from any form of initiation of hazing in the future except such as may be arranged for between a committee of the student body and the chancellor.
