

Thompson, provide for a salary sched-ule for the principal officials of \$20,-000 in view of the fact that the board is established on a more or less per-manent basis. 

> COMING MONDAY **'DAMAGED GOODS**"

Winnipeg, Feb. 14—Charges were made in the Manitoba legislature yes-terday by the leader of the opposition, P. A. Talbot, of Laverandrye, against the Norris government, of gross ex-travagance, mis-application of capital funds, and general inefficiency. Mr. Talbot spoke in reply to the budget speech of the Hon. Edward Brown, provincial treasurer. The leader of the opposition presented a series of com-parisons between the cost of admin-istering the provincial affairs in 1914 —the last spear of the Roblin regime— and the last fiscal year. "It cost \$561,680 more to govern Manitoba last year than it did in 1914," declared Mr. Talbot. He added that, on a careful computation of costs administrative expenditure should have been at least \$128,984 less in 1917 than in 1914.
