

PROHIBITION ACTIVITY IN MARYSVILLE

ARREST LAST NIGHT WILL RESULT IN PROSECUTION

**Resident of Town Found with
Liquor in His Possession in
the Streets—Frederic-
ton Case.**

The activity in the enforcement of The Provincial Prohibition Law which has the official name of The Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916, has extended itself to the town of Marysville where Town Marshal Fraser Saunders last night arrested a man belonging to the town in whose possession was found a bottle containing liquor. The prisoner was lodged in the town lock-up by the Marshal and proceedings under the act are expected to follow.

Found in the Street.

The arrest was made in the street, according to the statement of the police officer. Two men were found together but one made his escape. It is understood that this feature of the matter will enter into the case.

Expected to Be Contested.

Papers have not yet been issued in a Fredericton case which arose from the seizure of a bottle containing liquor by Sub-Inspector W. A. Johnson of Tracey, who took it from a man in a store in this city. Information has been laid, however, and it is expected that the case will be contested.

Heavy Importations.

It is reported that there have been heavy importations of liquor into Marysville for personal use and that the quantity now there is large.

ENTIRE ISSUE OF PROVINCIAL BONDS IS SOLD

**J. M. ROBINSON & SONS
SOLD \$1,000,000 WORTH**

**New Brunswick Investors Purchased Large Portion of the
Loan—Balance Sold in
Ontario.**

The entire issue of \$1,000,000 of six per cent. provincial bonds placed by the government in the hands of J. M. Robinson & Sons last week, has been disposed of. The bonds were issued in denominations of \$100, \$500 and \$1,000 and were offered to the public at 99.08, which will mean a yield to the investor of a little better than six per cent. A goodly proportion of the loan was taken up by investors within the province while the balance was disposed of in Ontario. Considering the tightness of the money market the issue is looked upon as highly satisfactory. The bonds will extend over a period of ten years.

BREAK IN COLD WEATHER HAS COME AT LAST

**Rain Accompanied by Thunder
and Lightning Early This
Morning—Roads in Bad
Condition.**

The long looked for break in the weather occurred last night and the result is that country roads which were blocked by snow are now in even worse condition, and in the city the sidewalks are in bad condition from melting snow and roofs are leaking in all sections of the city. The heavy snowfall this winter has made conditions worse than they usually are and the necessity for the gutters to be dug out was emphasized today in certain sections of the city.

Change in Temperature.

There was a marked change in temperature yesterday. Early in the morning the official temperature was little above zero and in the afternoon was about forty degrees above. The high temperature continued during the night and today with the result that the snow settled rapidly.

Danger of Falling Ice.

The mild weather has greatly increased the danger from falling ice and there have been a number of close escapes from serious injury. The police have instructed a number of persons to remove dangerous masses of ice from their roofs. In all cases it is the buildings erected some years ago that are the source of danger as the sloping roofs permit the ice to slide off after forming. UNUSUAL CASE ARGUED BEFORE APPEAL COURT

**ACTION OVER PROPERTY
IN CARLETON COUNTY**

**Husband Killed Wife and Then
Suicided—Heirs of Both
Claim Property—Point
of Sanity Raised.**

The session of the Appeal Division of the Supreme Court this morning was occupied entirely with the hearing of the appeal in the case of Wilson et al vs. eBill et al. The case is from Carleton county and concerns property left by a man who killed his wife and committed suicide, or by the wife. The case is most unusual and the points brought out are of great legal interest.

Circumstances of Case.

Wilson killed his wife and then hanged himself. The property was owned by both or the survivor. The wife's heirs took possession. The husband's heirs brought ejectment. There were two questions involved, first as to which one survived the other, the second as to whether he murdered his wife or was insane at the time of killing her. If it were murder then his heirs could not take the property on account of his crime. The jury found that she survived him and that he murdered her.

The motion for a new trial is made by A. B. Connell, K. C., and opposed by Mr. W. P. Jones, K. C. The grounds are, verdict against weight of evidence, improper admission of evidence and misdirection. The action was tried before Mr. Justice Chandler and a jury at the Carleton circuit in November. Court considers.

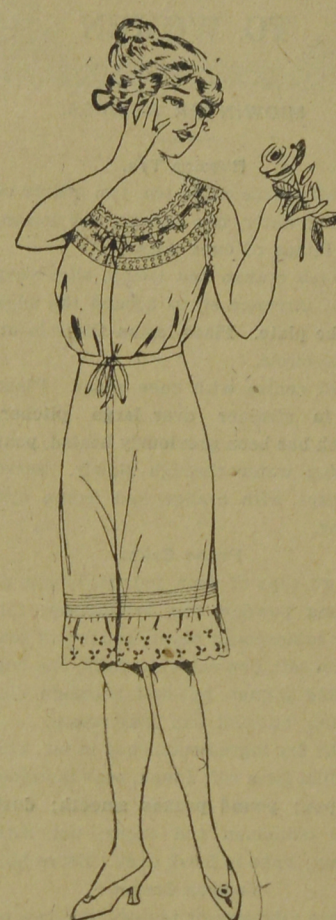
