All were seated in low leather chairs, which was an advantage for the Russians as they were thus able to get their weapons ready under the arble table without being observed. while their victims, leaning back in their chairs, offered an easy target.

"During the conversation the Russians began turning over the pages of their documents as though in search of some missing papers, and the attention of the Germans was thus distracted by this pause. While Count Mirbach and his colleagues imagined that the Russians were examining the documents, they had drawn out their weapons under the cover of the table, "They then sprang up with revolvers, and began firing, one Russian aiming at Count Mirbach, the other at the other two Germans. Mirbach was hit in the back of the head. On hearing the shots, people hurried in from the neighboring rooms, and the Russians thereupon took to flight, but, before springing out of the window each of them hurled a hand grenade. Only one grenade exploded, the splinters of which hit Count Mirbach, killing him
