EVERY MAN'S HAND IS AGAINST HIS NEIGHBOR

War Time Trials Are Having Their Effect on the German People --- Popular Dis- content is Fanned by the Work of the Profiteers --- The Newly Rich Flaunt Their Ill Acquired Wealth

Amsterdam, July 31—(Correspondence of The Associated Press) The moral deterioration of the German nation in consequence of wartime trials is greatly troubling clear-minded observers of the Fatherland. The Lutheran Synod of Berlin the other day called a special meeting to discuss how to deal with the dissolute ways of the thousands of young munition workers, male and female, who habitually squander their high wages in riotous living and immorality. It was agreed that most of the youth of the country seemed to be entirely beyond control.

Much has already been written about the unsafety of the public streets, and the general callous indifference to the sufferings of others. This seems to apply to the whole of Germany.

"Every man's hand seems to be against his neighbor," the Cologne Gazette despairingly exclaims, and it devotes a whole article to the intense if latent anger of the populace at the extortions to which it is being subjected by the unscrupulous methods of tradesmen, who in their turn are made the victims of deficient government control and the usurious practices of producers.

Popular discontent is fanned by announcements of extravagant profits such as those made by a meat firm which supplies the army. It operated with a capital of a million marks and in one year netted a profit of 722,638 marks.

Sarcastic comment abounds in respect of the newly rich who flaunt their recently acquired wealth in the faces of their less-favored fellow citizens. The vulgarian who at a restaurant calls for "three times a portion of whatever is most expensive" is a standing type.

Another feature is the phenomenal demand for real estate by war profiteers whose aim is to become "lord

of a manor." The German Tageszeitung the other day contained no fewer than 25 advertisements for country estates wanted at once, from 1,000 to 2,500 acres, price no object, although land has risen to double, and sometimes treble, the value of pre-war times.

All these things serve to embitter the helpless poorer classes to a degree the danger of which has not escaped the attention of the powers that be, as witness recent arrangements made at Munster, Westphalia, where the service of the clergy has been enlisted by the officials war food department to keeping down the growing popular discontent over the food difficulties.

Even the Rhenish Westphalian Gazette, which gives publicity to this interesting piece of news, expresses the fear that the last few months preceding the harvest will be an exceedingly trying time, and for this reason the war food department wishes to remain in constant touch with the minor clergy, so as to have the benefit of their observations among the people.

With reference to this, the socialistic Vorwaerts prophetically exclaims "After the war there will be only two camps—war profiteers and out and out socialists."

ENCOURAGING REPORT FROM THE CANADIANS

Our Boys are Fighting With Great Dash and Gallantry— An Enemy Troop Train Captured.

Ottawa, Aug. 18.—The following despatch from overseas was received here tonight.

"The sixth day of the battle found the Canadians penetrating into the German lines to a depth of fifteen miles from their starting point, with brisker fighting in progress and resistance stiffening. The situation is encouraging, the Canadians are nullifying the counter-attacks and pressing ahead. Prisoners unanimously admit the marvelous success of the surprise effect of the whole Canadian operation.

The Canadian Corps participated in a most unique, combined cooperative effort of all arms of the service—infantry, artillery, motor machine guns, cavalry, tanks and aeroplanes—in the history of the war.

There was perfect liaison throughout. The success is an outstanding tribute to the effect work and organization.

One hour and forty minutes after zero, the Canadian field guns had dashed forward and were in action two miles beyond the German front lines. The dash and gallantry of the Canadian infantry in overcoming the perfect sleet of machine gun fire is universally praised. The Canadian cavalry captured an enemy troop train containing 27 officers and 500 men just as their detachment was commencing.

Accounts of the spectacular courage of individual officers, and men are being recounted by hundreds.

THE KILLING OF A GERMAN AMBASSADOR

Russian Assassins, Seated at a Table, Were Able to Get Their Weapons Out Unobserved.

Amsterdam, July 10—(Correspondence of The Associated Press) Russians who assassinated General Von Mirbach, the German Ambassador to Russia, concealed their weapons under the table over which they were conversing with the German diplomat, according to details of the killing published by the Berlin Lokal Anzeiger as coming from an eye-witness of the murder.

"Count Mirbach, Privy Councillor Rissler, and Lieutenant Musler, were seated with the two Russians at a marble table in the middle of the room,"

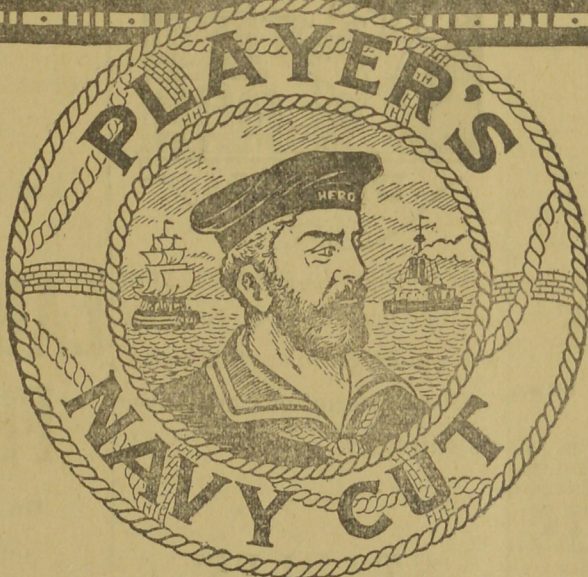

says the witness, "On one side were the Germans, and on the other the Russians. All were seated in low leather chairs, which was an advantage for the Russians as they were thus able to get their weapons ready under the arble table without being observed, while their victims, leaning back in their chairs, offered an easy target.

"During the conversation the Russians began turning over the pages of their documents as though in search of some missing papers, and the attention of the Germans was thus distracted by this pause. While Count Mirbach and his colleagues imagined that the Russians were examining the documents, they had drawn out their weapons under the cover of the table.

"They then sprang up with revolvers, and began firing, one Russian aiming at Count Mirbach, the other at the other two Germans. Mirbach was hit in the back of the head. On hearing the shots, people hurried in from the neighboring rooms, and the Russians thereupon took to flight, but, before springing out of the window each of them hurled a hand grenade. Only one grenade exploded, the splinters of which hit Count Mirbach, killing him immediately."
