

STRICT RULE RE ENTERTAINMENTS IS GAZETTED

PERMIT MUST BE GOT FOR ALL BUT PATRIOTIC

William H. McQuade Appointed Collector of Amusement Tax in Place of H. J. Anderson.

The Royal Gazette contains notice that a strict rule with regard to the licensing of all public entertainments at which an admission fee is charged other than those which are exclusively for patriotic purposes, has been passed by the Provincial Government. The new regulation is in connection with the Amusement Tax and is as follows:

"No entertainment of whatever sort or description to which an admission fee is charged and the proceeds of which are not wholly for patriotic purposes shall be held without a permit allowing the said entertainment to be held, and providing at the same time for a supply of amusement tax tickets necessary in connection therewith: If such entertainment is held without a permit from the Amusement Tax Inspector, the promoters of the same shall be liable to the penalties provided for in the 11th section of the Theatres and Cinematographs Act."

Provincial Tax Inspector William H. McQuade of St. John has been appointed Provincial Tax Inspector by the Provincial Government. His duties will include the collection of the Amusement Tax and the enforcement of the regulations of the Lieutenant Governor-in-Council in connection therewith and also the collection of the licenses upon motor vehicles and the taxes upon Extra-Provincial Corporations. The appointment of Mr. McQuade in respect to the Amusement Tax is in place of that of H. J. Anderson of St. John whose temporary appointment will expire on the 30th inst.

Revisor For Devon Mr. Harold B. Colwell has been gazetted revisor for the Town of Devon.

Assistant Engineer Norman I. Foster has been appointed assistant engineer to the Water Powers Commission.

Game Licenses Mr. Fred H. Ferguson, corner of Northumberland and Brunswick streets has been appointed a vendor of game licenses.

Tait an enterprising young farmer of Dorchester, was in the city yesterday en route home from Jacksonville, Carleton County, where he represented the agricultural department at the Poultry and Pig Fair. He says that the exhibits were of a high standard and much interest was manifested.

CASUALTIES FROM THIS SECTION OF PROVINCE CONTINUE TO INCREASE TWO REPORTED KILLED TODAY

Sergt. Harry Heron, of Marysville, Killed in Action with New Brunswick Infantry Battalion—Widow and Little Son Survive—Private Carl G. Watters, of Barker's Point, Drafted from Depot Battalion Some Months Ago, Also Killed—Bombardier John H. McCollom Wounded in Face and Neck—Murray Finlayson Killed.

The casualties from this part of the province continue to be reported from France. Two well known young men from this section are reported killed. One of them had joined the C. E. F. under the Military Service Act. One of the first Boston recruits for the 236th also is reported killed.

Sergt. Harry Heron Mrs. Hazel Heron of South Devon was officially informed this morning that her husband Sergt. Harry Heron was killed in action in France with the infantry September 2nd. The deceased left Canada with the 140th Battalion and for some time was an instructor with a Canadian reserve battalion in England. Some months ago he reverted to private and went to France where he joined a well known New Brunswick battalion with which he soon was given the rank of sergeant. He was twenty-eight years old and prior to enlistment was an employe of the Canadian Cottons Limited at Marysville. Besides the widow one little son Harry survives. The deceased soldier also is survived by his parents Mr. and Mrs. William Heron of Marysville one brother Percy also one sister Mrs. Walter Harrison of North Devon.

Boston Highlander Killed Friends in Fredericton have been notified from Boston that Murray Finlayson of that city one of the first recruits secured in Boston for the 236th MacLean Highlanders was killed in action some days ago.

Private Carl G. Watters A telegram was received by Mr. Andrew Watters of Barker's Point stating that his son Private Carl G. Watters had been killed in action in France on 3rd September. His friends received letters from him stating that he was in England on Aug. 12th and expected to be in France soon. He left here with the draft of the Depot battalion about six months ago. He is survived by his parents, three brothers, Albert in France, Bruce and Daniel at home and by three sisters Annie in Maine, Mildred teaching school at St. George, and Isabel at home.

Bombardier J. H. McCollom Word was received by his wife this morning that Bombardier J. H. McCollom has been admitted to No. 4

Casualty Clearing Hospital with gunshot wounds in the face and neck. Bombardier McCollom left this side with a draft from the 9th Heavy S'ega Battery holding the rank of Battery Sergeant Major. He reverted to the ranks and went to France with the members of the draft for service in a Canadian Siege Battery. He was for some time a resident of St. John and then became chief of the Fredericton police force. He has one brother Ernest, who is now in Scotland having been wounded and gassed so many times with the P. P. C. L. I. that he is now unfit for further service in France.

Bombardier McCollom served in South Africa with the 2nd Battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment.

FARM LEAVE IS EXTENDED TO OCTOBER 31

Inquiry of Minister of Agriculture Produces Satisfactory Reply—Order Already Issued.

In answer to a telegram of inquiry from Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, minister of agriculture, Hon. T. A. Crerar, federal minister, wired yesterday that the leave of bona fide farmers who are draftees under the M. S. A. had been extended to October 31, provided military exigencies did not require otherwise.

Later the minister received the following self explanatory message from the Minister of Militia:

Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 17, 1918. Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, Fredericton, N. B.

General officers commanding Military Districts have been instructed that extension of harvest furlough to the 31st of October may be granted in cases where the saving of crops is at stake subject to cancellation at any time should that course become necessary.

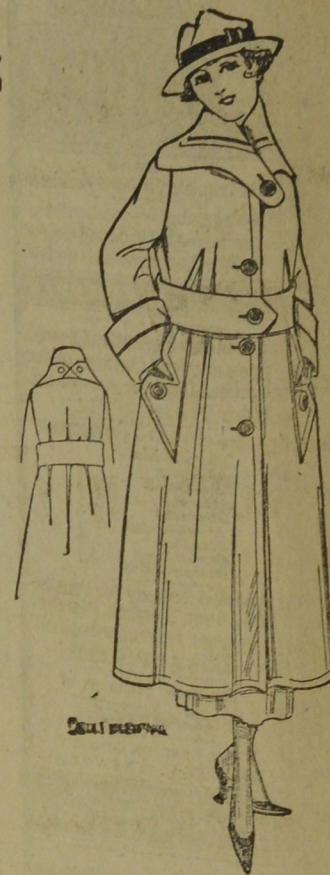
