If the disease appears in the fam ily, put the patient at once to bed, pre-ferably in an upper room, well aired,

wear a mask of simple gause over the mouth and nose. The same gauze should not be used for more than two hours, and then burned.

6. Insist upon the patient using a handkerchief to cover coughing or sneezing (paper ones will do); these handkerchiefs should be burned at
