

BOARD OF TRADE HELD MEETING LAST EVENING

VARIOUS MATTERS OF
INTEREST DISCUSSED

Alarm Signals Installed at Rail-
way Crossings—Telephone
Line to Minto Being
Constructed.

A meeting of the Fredericton Board of Trade was held at the Board rooms last evening.

Mr. H. S. Campbell the President of the Board stated that the signals at the railway crossings on George and Charlotte streets had been placed and were being tested. He stated also that the road between the Experimental Farm and Victoria Mill had been greatly improved. As regards the coal rate between Minto and Fredericton he had nothing to report as yet.

Minto Phone Service

Mr. F. T. Atkinson, Superintendent of the N. B. Telephone Company advised the Board that an independent line was being installed between Fredericton and Minto and that an exchange would be located at Minto. He stated that the work is being greatly helped by the coal mine owners of Minto.

Mr. Atkinson was admitted to the Board. The president stated that the City Council acting with the Board of Trade were ascertaining if any soldiers would be quartered here this winter.

J. M. Robinson Heard

An instructive address was delivered by Mr. J. M. Robinson of St. John on the valuation of the different classes of Bonds and particularly in the Victory Bond Issue now about to be launched. Mr. Robinson was of the opinion that no better investment could be made as this issue would probably be the last one exempt from taxation. He was of the opinion that the bonds would be in great demand by trust companies and executors of estates as a safe investment and that judging from the previous experience with war loans the last issue will in a short time be selling above par.

An address will be given by Mr. Frank Stockdale of Chicago this evening on Salesmanship and on the coming Victory Loan issue.

The case of Chase vs. Forsythe, adjourned from the Queen's County Circuit, is being heard before His Honor Judge Chandler here today. R. B. Hanson, K. C. and R. W. McLellan are appearing as counsel. The case concerns some logs and the parties belong in the vicinity of Chipman.

Bliss H. Dunfield of Halifax, N. S., Harry C. Heans of St. John and Gordon G. Scott of Fredericton have been incorporated under New Brunswick letters patent as The Nerepis Lumber Company Limited with head office at Welsford and a capital stock of \$9000. The company is empowered to take over the sawmill at Sagawa, King's County, and to run a general milling lumbering and pulpwood business.

Mr. H. R. Grant, of Edward, Mass., who left here last Thursday for a hunting trip on Cain's river with "Bill" Craig, returned last evening. Mr. Grant succeeded in getting two deer and a fine moose. His hunting trip was cut short by news arriving that his brother was very ill and not expected to live. Mr. Geo. T. Otte, of Greenwich, Conn., succeeded in getting a fine moose, two deer and a bear. He was out on Cain's River with Robert Craig. Mr. C. H. Hersley, of New Jersey, has gone on a hunting trip with James Black, entering the woods at Bathurst for the Nepisiguit river.

Boy Safe at Home

Willie Duke, the seven-year-old boy who was taken from a train at Vanceboro, Me., last week by a United States immigration official and whom the Fredericton police were asked to locate is safe at his home in Stoneham, Mass., having been taken there by his mother on Tuesday. His grandfather Thomas Harris of Devon so informed the police yesterday. The letter which the boy's mother wrote to the police here must have been delayed in some manner as it was not received until yesterday morning after the mother who made the inquiries, had personally come for her son. When taken from the train at Vanceboro the boy was returned to Fredericton.

CLOSING OF PUBLIC PLACES IS ANNOUNCED

BOWLING ALLEYS, POOL
AND BILLIARD ROOM, TOO

City Board of Health Acting—
Schools to Close Friday Af-
ternoon—Confusion
re Date.

The Fredericton Board of Health met last night to take action in accordance with the proclamation issued by Dr. G. G. Melvin, Chief Medical Officer of New Brunswick, closing all churches, theatres and school on account of the threatening epidemic of Spanish Influenza. The Board decided to issue notices to all religious bodies and owners of theatres as well as the School Board requiring them to comply with the order contained in the proclamation. The Salvation Army is to be permitted to hold open air services. Both the University of New Brunswick and the Provincial Normal School are to close.

Pool Rooms and Bowling Alleys
There was some doubt concerning the application of the order to bowling alleys, pool rooms and billiard parlors but Secretary Dibblee in telephone communication this morning with Dr. Melvin was informed that there would be a supplement to the proclamation which would specifically mention those places of amusement.

Misunderstanding re Date
There seems to be some misunderstanding about the date upon which the order is to go into effect. Some claim that the buildings specified cannot be open on Friday but others claim that they can the proclamation calling for them to be closed that night and not to be opened until further notice.

To Finish School Week

The Department of Education is taking the view that the proclamation permits the public schools to finish the school week and close Friday afternoon. Teachers have been instructed to that effect.

No New Cases

The Fredericton Board of Health has received no notification of any further cases. Miss Flewelling, demonstrator at the Normal School has the only pronounced case. Major Luton stated this afternoon that all the suspected cases at the Military Hospital had developed into ordinary cases of la grippe.

At Southampton

Spanish Influenza of a violent type has broken out in the family of the late Arlington Wright of Southampton. Mrs. Wright and her son Lee had mild cases of the disease and now Mrs. Wright's daughter Mrs. Frank Cronkite has the disease which has developed into pneumonia. Dr. Lee Brown of Woodstock is attending Mrs. Cronkite and is now in communication with the County Board of Health to have the house quarantined. It is supposed the disease was carried by Lee Wright going to and from Sussex by train. Miss Vera Brooks of Danforth, Maine, who has been seriously ill with the disease has recovered and is now out of danger. Miss Brooks is a native of Southampton.

FRENCH MAKE BIG CAPTURE

Paris, Oct. 9.—In an advance of about eight kilometres east of St. Quentin, the railroad junction point of Mezieres-Sur-Oise has been captured by the French who also took two thousand prisoners and a number of guns, according to the French official communication issued tonight. Big gains also have been made by the French along the Aisne, where 600 more prisoners were taken.
