FRENCH MAKE BIG CAPTURE

Paris, Oct. 9-In an advance of about eight kilometres east of St. Contin, the railroad junction point of Mezieres-Sur-Oise has been captured by the French who also took two thousand prisoners and a number of guns, according to the French official communication issued tonight. Big gains also have been made by the French along the Alsne, where 600 more prisoners
