

GOOD WINTER RECIPES

Eggless Squash Pie.

One and one-half cups dry mealy quash; 1 cup boiling milk, half a cup sugar, 1 cracker rolled fine, half teaspoon each of salt and cinnamon. Bake with one crust in moderate oven an

### Jelly Chocolates.

1 cup apple jelly, 2 tablespoons of gelatine, 1 teaspoon orange extract, half cup cold water or less, half a teaspoon lemon extract.

Melt apple jelly over hot water, add gelatine soaked in cold water, and extracts. Strain into small molds and if in a sheet, cut the jelly in cubes. Dip in melting coating chocolate.

### Chocolate Dainties.

Melt milk chocolate in double boiler, remove from the fire and beat until cool. In this dip nuts or sweet fruits and place on oiled paper.

### Parisian Sweets.

Put through the meat chopper 1 pound of prepared dates, figs and nut meats. Add 1 tablespoon orange juice. a little grated orange peel and quarter cup honey or syrup. Mold into balls and roll in chopped nuts or cocoanut or chocolate. This mixture may be packed in an oiled tin, put undor a weight until firm, then cut in any shape desired. Melted chocolate may be added to mixture before molding, if desired.

## HINTS TO HOUSEWIVES.

To tint discolored lace curtains, mix equal quantities of ordinary starch and cornstarch, boil and use in the same way as white starch.

A tepid or warm salt bath makes a good substitute for a sea plunge, and a handful of wet salt rubbed briskly on the skin will be found most invig orating




