

PLANNING THE GARDEN

Article No. 4.

There are three types of home vegetable garden: (1) the farmer's garden, (2) the village, small town or suburban garden, (3) the city garden.

For the present we will have to leave a further consideration of the farmers' garden and consider problems of the smaller gardens.

The village or suburban garden often presents conditions very different from those of the farm. The space is more limited, so that the vegetables must be planted closer together, and all cultivation done by hand, and it is often advisable to omit certain vegetables that require a large amount of space.

The backyard garden of the city calls for more extensive methods and usually presents greater difficulties. However, limitations of space and poorness of soil may be offset to some extent by the availability of water and opportunity for improving the soil by the addition of lime and manure.

In order to obtain the best results, every foot of our small garden should be kept constantly in crop, if possible. This may only be accomplished by making a definite plan of the garden some weeks before planting. By laying out the garden on paper in this way much time will be saved, mistakes will be avoided, and better all-round results may be secured. Make the plan on strong paper that will stand frequent handling, and use outdoors. Draw it on a fairly large scale—one inch to 4 feet is suggested, so as to leave room for notes and dates of planting for each crop.

The following points should be considered in deciding on the position of each crop in the garden. These points are applicable to all three types of gardens, but more particularly to the small ones.

Permanent or perennial plants, such as asparagus, rhubarb and small fruits, should be located along one side or end. Small plants such as beets, carrots, lettuce, parsnips, etc., which need much the same treatment and only small spaces between the drills, should be grouped in adjacent rows. If they are grouped in this manner according to cultural requirements, then each group may be planted and tended as one crop and the operations simplified. Tall plants, giving heavy shade, such as corn, should not be where they will shade small sun-loving plants. Potatoes and sweet corn need about the same amount of space and will go well

CAPT. SAUCIER CONVICTED BY COURT MARTIAL

Montreal, March 26.—Paymaster and Honorary Capt. Theodore J. Saucier, of A Unit, Military Hospitals Commission Command, was found guilty this afternoon by a general court martial, over which Major General Henry Smith of the permanent staff, of Ottawa, presided, on nine charges laid against him, all of a similar nature, that of having broken the King's regulations by signing documents and cheques in blank.

It was made clear that Hon. Capt. Saucier had not done anything to impugn his personal honor, and that he was in no way connected with the defalcation of one of the employees under him, Private J. J. O'Neill, to the amount of \$2,600.

together. Cucumbers, squash, etc., should be grouped. If part of the land is low and moist, it should be devoted to such vegetables as celery and onions. If part is high, dry and warm, that is the place for nearly crops.

In a garden of small area sometimes two crops may be grown in one row at one time, for example, lettuce and radish, parsnips and lettuce, corn and pumpkins, lettuce and early cabbage, etc. Also, as soon as an early crop is harvested it may be replaced by a crop which will be ready for harvesting before the fall frosts. Examples of successful planting are peas, early beets, radish and lettuce, to be followed by turnips, beans, carrots, cabbage, cauliflower, late beans or tomatoes.

The mistake is often made of sowing the different vegetables only once, whereas two or three plantings of the same vegetables at intervals of ten days or so will extend the season for them.

What vegetables to grow, varieties to select, and seed required, will be considered next week.
