

PHIL. SULLIVAN KILLED IN MILL AT STANLEY

**EMPLOYED IN DOUGLASS
SAWMILL AT THAT PLACE**

**While Oiling Shaft was Caught
and Whirled Around to
His Death—Widow
Survives.**

Philip Sullivan, a well known resident of Stanley, was killed instantly in the Douglass sawmill at that place this morning. Mr. Howard T. Douglass of Stanley, who was in the city, received the news by telephone. As far as is known the deceased was leaning over a revolving shaft oiling it. His clothing was caught by the shaft and he was whirled to his death. His body was badly mangled.

The deceased was well known throughout this part of New Brunswick. He is survived by a widow, formerly Mrs. Dennis Lynch of Oromocto, whose maiden name was McSheffrey.

DAYLIGHT SAVING PLAN STRONGLY OPPOSED BY THE GREATER FOOD PRODUCTION COM. WHICH MET HERE

**Intensive Cultivation Favored Rather Than Increased Acreage
—Immediate Purchase of Feed and Fertilizer to Safeguard
Farmers of Province is Advocated— Vacant Land to be
Plowed for Cropping in 1919—Address by Dr. J. W. Robertson Heard—Demonstration for Treatment of Smut.**

The committee on greater production for the Province of New Brunswick conferred with Dr. J. W. Robertson of Ottawa, yesterday afternoon and last evening and arrived at some very important conclusions. A large number of delegates from the various sections of the province were in attendance. One important matter was the passing of a resolution condemning Daylight Saving legislation proposed by the Dominion government.

Afternoon Meeting.

Immediately after Dr. Robertson's address before the Legislature the delegates met in one of the committee rooms and the afternoon was given up to discussion on the various problems confronting the farmers of the province. The following took part:

Committee Meeting.

In the evening a committee of ten met to consider the matters which had been discussed, and they decided that, under the present conditions, it would be well for the greater production committee to concentrate in assisting the dealers or the farmers in any section to secure a supply of feed and fertilizer and recommended that any feed on the market be purchased immediately in order that it might be safe for the province. It was also recommended that demonstration work for the treatment of smut be taken up immediately. They urged the introduction of work and organization for food production through every channel possible. They would urge that every acre which is sown to crop this year be very carefully cultivated rather than a large acreage poorly sown.

Cultivation of Vacant Land.

The subject of the cultivation of an area of vacant land within the province was discussed at some length, and it was decided that this spring it was not altogether practical, but plans will be made immediately in order that an area may be plowed up during the summer and fall for cropping next spring.

Definite action will be taken immediately in these matters. Mr. E. A. Schofield was chairman of the meeting.

Daylight Saving.

The resolution against Daylight Saving was as follows:

Whereas, we, the Greater Food Production Committee of the Province of New Brunswick, here assembled, have been advised that the Dominion Government contemplates the enactment of the law known as the Daylight Saving Bill;

Therefore, Resolved, that we place ourselves upon record as being strongly of the opinion that the passage of this measure would be extremely detrimental to the cause of Greater Food Production, which we believe to be paramount in the present crisis.
