CONQUEST OF RUSSIAN REVOLUTION REDUCED TO NOTHING BY BERLIN

LONDON, March 7.—The often reiterated statement of the English correspondents that anything may happen in Russia at any time and that nothing need cause surprise, may possibly be illustrated by the developments there relating to the ratification of the Russo-German peace treaty, according to reports here today. It is said that a section of the Bolsheviks is in no wise pleased with the surrender of Nikolai Lenine, and the Daily Mail's Petrograd correspondent predicts a formidable opposition to the peace party.

A Berlin despatch received in Amsterdam today forecasts the early resignation of Lenine and Trotzky, owing to their increasing unpopularity.

A Ring of Iron Around Russia.

Petrograd, March 7.—To a gathering of workmen and soldier delegates at Moscow on Monday, M. Prokrovsky, leader of the second peace delegation at Brest-Litovsk, explained the treaty with the Central Powers.

Deeply moved, he begged those in sympathy with the democratic revolution not to deceive themselves. The new frontiers traced by Germany, M. Prokrovsky declared, constitute a ring of iron around revolutionary Russia. He said the Germans were endeavoring to stifle the revolution, the conquests of which were reduced to nothing by the economic demands of Berlin. Military evacuation by Russia of Esthonia, Courland and Livonia gave the enemy full authority in these regions.

Germans are Still Doubtful.

Amsterdam, March 7.—Despite orders from the high command for the German people to beflag their towns and rejoice over peace with Russia, notes of doubt are not lacking in the German press in regard to the future in the East. The Vorwaerts says that Russian territory is not the place the Germans longed for, or German occupation calculated to endure. It adds: "We should regard it as wiser and more farseeing if the German government had not exploited to the utmost the helplessness of the Russian peoples and forced a peace for which the only historical parallel is that which crushed Prussia was obliged to conclude at Tilsit in 1807. The German social democracy must now take up the fight with the object of preventing the new neighboring states from being treated by Germany as subjugated peoples."

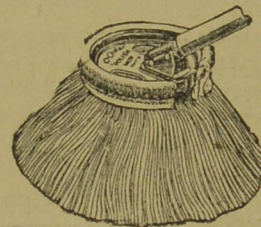
