It will be well on in February before any large supplies of raw sugar reach Canada, and in the meantime the supply will be limited owing to the small stocks on hand.

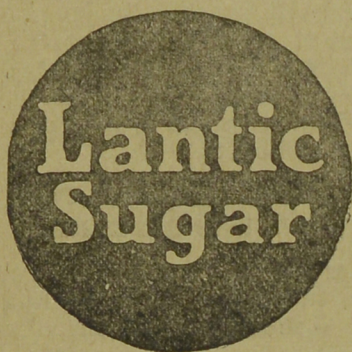

YORK COUNTY ADOPTS LAW FOR PROTECTION OF SHEEP

Dog Tax to be Levied in all Parishes Will be Used to Reimburse Owners of Sheep Killed by Dogs--McAdam Councillors Objecting--Assessment Placed at \$32,000--Smaller Than in Recent Years.

The Municipal Council of York Friday afternoon enacted a by-law which puts into effect in the county the provincial law relating to the protection of sheep from dogs. The by-law was enacted without opposition except from McAdam, the councillors from that parish opposing the by-law because sheep are not kept in that section of the county, there being practically no farming in that parish. The unexpended balance of the Halifax Relief grant was placed at the disposal

of Mr. Charles FitzRandolph who expended the portion already used to the great satisfaction of the councillors. An estimate of \$1,500 was passed for the Board of Health expenses in the ensuing year, smallpox bills making the amount large. The total assessment was passed at \$32,062.21, which is an amount less than assessments of recent years. A special committee was appointed to take up with the provincial legislature the matter of increased fees for jurymen.

The by-law with regard to the protection of sheep from dogs puts an annual tax of one dollar on each dog and five dollars on each bitch, to be collected by the assessors who will register the dogs. The money so raised is to be deposited with the county treasurer for the purpose of reimbursing sheep owners who may lose sheep through the ravages of dogs. The law also provides that fifteen per cent of the dog taxes raised in a city or town shall be devoted to a similar purpose. The council resumed business at 2.30 p. m. Friday.

Mr. Thomas Parker of Doaktown, member of the municipal council of Northumberland, was present and was

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invited to address the council. He dealt with various matters including Patriotic Fund, land settlement and the need of population in this province.

Halifax Relief Grant.

Warden Brewer announced that the crew sent to Halifax to work on reconstruction would return at once and instructions were needed concerning the disposal of the balance of the grant of \$5,000.

On the motion of Coun. Dougan the balance of the grant was ordered to be disposed as Mr. Charles FitzRandolph might see fit. Coun. Dougan referred to the fact that Mr. FitzRandolph had done his work well.

On the motion of Coun. B. D. Clarkson seconded by Coun. Pond, it was decided to appoint two collecting justices for the parish of Stanley.

Board of Health Report.

Mr. Clarence N. Goodspeed, chairman of the County Board of Health, presented his annual report. Receipts amounted to \$934.18 and there was a balance of \$250.06. Estimates for the year coming were \$1,500. That would meet all accounts now outstanding and those for smallpox had been heavy. Outstanding accounts probably were upward of \$1,200. About \$700 had been expended on vaccination in two parishes. Mr. G. Y. Dibblee, secretary of the Fredericton Board of Health had suggested to him that the provincial government be asked to pay the cost of vaccination. It was probable that the government would pay it. In the county the expense was \$700. There also was prospect of getting a refund of \$500 on the St. Mary's Indian Reserve smallpox expenditure,

from the Dominion department of the interior.

Coun. Grant complained that at Dow Settlement disease which did not at all incapacitate the patients, was called smallpox.

Mr. Goodspeed replied that many persons discounted the seriousness of the smallpox outbreak. The disease was of a mild type. When physicians reported smallpox the Board of Health could not question the matter.

The report of Mr. Goodspeed was adopted.
