## DRAFT EVADERS ARE HIDING IN THE TERREBOUNE WOODS

### Forty of Them Living in a Camp Away From Civilization--Have Laid in a Supply of Defensive Arms and Have No Trouble Getting Provisions

(Montreal Star)

There's a cabin in the woods up back of Terrebonne with 40 evaders of military service making their home in it. The complete story of the thing as told to the Star, makes an enlightening tale.

Terrebonne is not the only offending place, for Ste. Therese and a dozen other localities with surrounding woods, a few recalcitrants are boldly bragging that their boys will go to war when they have to, and not before.

Certainly at Terrebonne the young men are not holding back in order to work on farms and gather in the maturing crops. They are not attempting to work on farms, but instead are enjoying wild day and night orgies, some seven miles away from their homes. They do not limit themselves to a company of one sex, but neighboring farmer's families join in the "doings" at the camp in the woods owned by one of the best known men in Terrebonne, whose son though eligible for service, has not yet been called up by the Registrar, and makes open boast that when the summons comes, he will then tie himself to the seclusion of the bush, where his pals now find refuge from their duty to their fellow Canadians who are in France fighting their battles. One man in Terrebonne said to the Star: "It is disgusting to think that some of our best known families smile at such cowardice. When some others whom we know, and who are sons of the town, have gone to fight for our country, homes, the women, and have given their lives in sacrifice, in order that these caddish and contemptible cowards may hide themselves from the duty they have been called upon to perform."

### Not Enough Courage to Fire

The cabin in the woods where these forty defaulters are skulking, is about seven miles from Terrebonne village and is situated well in the interior of a seventeen mile wood. They have laid in a supply of defensive arms, so it is said, although the patriots in Terrebonne remark that they haven't courage enough to "fire a shotgun at a rabbit." Every second day or so, some of the party sneak into town and load themselves with provisions, making their way back to camp before daylight comes again.

Among this gang there are said to

be two deserters from Kingston, Ont. These fellows are natives of Terrebonne, who, when they were ordered to report themselves for duty, went to Kingston and enlisted with the Royal Horse Artillery. In course of time they were granted a week's leave and returning to their homes, the less dutiful youths of the village induced them to throw off their uniforms and join them in their wood skulking game. They have joined their fellows and are now in the aforementioned cabin.

### 100 Hiding at Ste. Therese

In the extensive woods back of Ste. Therese, local informants say there are over one hundred hiding. It is also common talk in that vicinity of how last week a stranger, making a short cut through the woods came upon the skulkers quite by accident. He was given a thrashing on the mere suspicion that he was a military policeman. When he got clear of his associates, he came to Montreal and reported it to the military authorities. The next day, a week ago last Thursday a party of 300 police is said to have been sent out to the district, when a large number were gathered into the net.

It is now said in military circles that unless all who should report themselves do so by August 24, very severe measures will be taken.

## TO ESTABLISH EASTERN FRONT

Washington, Aug. 13.—The possibility of an establishment of an eastern front that will be a serious menace at least, to the Germans, is being considered by officials here, it became known today, in the making public of the full text of the proclamation of the "supreme government of the northern territory."

The signers of the proclamation are two ex-premiers, members of the constituent assembly, representing the provinces of Novogorod, Archangel, Vologda, Viatka, Kazan and Samara—a chain of provinces extending from the Arctic to the region of the Don Cossacks in the south.

This chain is in the form of a crescent making a complete front of peoples strongly pro-ally in sentiment and representing the best elements of the Russian population.

"Oh, no, Sir Wilfrid; only a truthful man and one who can appreciate your greatness. All Canadians will acknowledge this," said Mr. Webber.

Sir Wilfrid remarked that he hoped Mr. Webber would have the best of luck in his professional career, and shook hands with Price, who continued on his journey to Sherbrooke where he appeared at His Majesty's last night.

Sir Wilfrid was looking very well indeed, and will stop a few days visiting friends in Magog, and all will wish him the best of health and strength to attend to his many arduous duties.

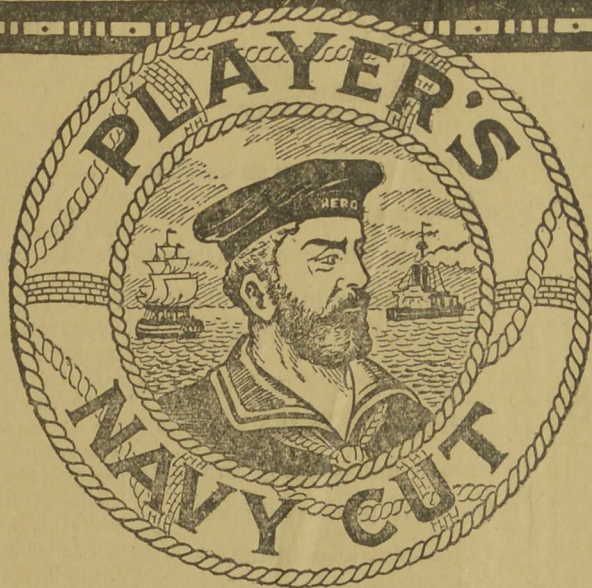
