TWO LIVES LOST IN TERRIBLE ACCIDENT AT OROMOCTO

W. T. H. Fenety and His Wife, of Fredericton, Drowned When Their Car Plunged Into Open Draw of Oromocto Bridge Tuesday Afternoon---Stories of Accident Differ in Detail but Car Thought to Be Out of Control---Double Funeral Here Thursday Afternoon

In the most terrible accident which has stirred this section of New Brunswick in years Mr. and Mrs. William T. H. Fenety of Fredericton lost their lives at about four o'clock yesterday afternoon, when the motor car in which they were coming from Public Landing to this city ran into the open draw of the bridge which spans the Oromocto River near its mouth and sank in deep water. In spite of the fact that there were several eye-witnesses of the accident the stories of the circumstances do not agree in detail. The exact cause of the tragedy never will be known but it is generally believed that the car Mr. Fenety was driving was out of his control.

At High Speed.

The draw in the bridge was open to admit of the passage of the tug Daniel at about four o'clock. The Fenety car was first observed coming down the Oromocto hill at a high rate of speed. Residents of Oromocto village say that they noticed that the car was making an unusual noise and believe that there was some thing wrong with it. The chains which guard the bridge when the draw is open were in place closing it to traffic. The car smashed through the chain at the Oromocto end of the draw and kept on at high speed. The driver evidently applied the brakes for the bridge flooring is scored and torn almost the entire distance from the position of the chain to the draw. In that distance, according to some the car made a great plunge against the bridge railing and another which carried it into the open draw. Some believe that the driver realizing that his car was out of control was trying to turn or upset it. Others say that the car appeared to stop some feet short of the open draw and then leap forward and believe that Mr. Fenety accidentally touched his accelerator. Stories of the fall of the car also differ some saying that Mrs. Fenety stood up and that her husband jumped and others saying that neither jumped. There also are stories to the effect that Mr. Fenety was liable to attacks of faintness and may have been seized by one.

Came to Surface.

Mr. Fenety came to the surface after the car took the plunge but his wife did not appear. Witnesses of the accident were unable to offer assistance to the unfortunate man as none of the boats along the shore had oars. After a time he sank. Bystanders with boards for paddles put out in boats. Fred Davis, Waldo Currie and others were among them. At about 4.30 the body of Mr. Fenety was found and was brought ashore.

Caused Sensation

News of the accident was sent to Fredericton within a few minutes of the time in which it happened, and caused a profound sensation as the victims were widely known. The pulmotor purchased some months ago by the City of Fredericton was rushed to the scene in the car of Ashley A. Colter almost record time being made on the run. Mr. W. W. O. Fenety son of the deceased and Mr. Fred P. Colter his son-in-law, and a large number of

friends also went to Oromocto at once. The pulmotor was used under the direction of Dr. C. P. Holden but without effect. Search for the body of Mrs. Fenety was continued Indians assisting. It was thought that the body was caught under the car and the tug Daniel was used in the attempt to raise it. When the car was moved Mrs. Fenety's hand bag and a lunch basket floated to the surface. Shortly before six o'clock the car was raised and placed on the bank by means of blocks. Those who examined it found that it was much damaged but that the emergency brakes had not been set and that the engine had not been stopped.

Charles Flett of Fredericton found the body of Mrs. Fenety about five hours after the horrible accident. The body was found some forty feet below the bridge from which the car took its final plunge. This is the nineteenth body of a drowned person which has been found by Mr. Flett who appears to have a peculiar faculty of locating them. He found Mrs. Fenety's body after grappling only ten minutes although others had searched for several hours.

Daughter Escaped

For a time it was thought that Miss Mary Fenety, daughter of the deceased, was in the car at the time of the accident, as it was her intention to return to Fredericton with her parents. Fortunately she did not accompany them.

The Gagetown train on the St. John & Quebec Railway was held at Oromocto until Mrs. Fenety's body was found and both bodies were brought here last night.

Well Known Man

The late W. T. H. Fenety was a son of the late George E. Fenety, of Fredericton, some time King's Printer. In early life he was connected with the Record newspaper in St. John. Later he conducted a book and stationery business in Fredericton leaving that business some eighteen years ago. Since that date he has been prominently identified with theatrical and amusement enterprises in this city. For many years he was lessee and manager of the Fredericton City Opera House and until quite recently all theatrical bookings for this city were made through him.

When motion pictures came in he established the Unique Theatre in the Masonic Building, Carleton Street, and later the Gaiety Theatre in the same street. The two were amalgamated when the new Gaiety Theatre was established in Queen Street, about a year ago, his son W. W. O. Fenety, who had been associated with the Gaiety Theatre, joining him in the enterprise. Through his connection with theatrical and amusement enterprises the deceased was widely known throughout Canada and the United States.

He was secretary of the Wilmot Park Board since its establishment in 1894.

Surviving Relatives

The late Mr. Fenety is survived by three brothers and three sisters, Harris G. Fenety, barrister, of Fredericton; Walter Fenety, Dominion Immigration official at McAdam; Linden Fenety, in the west; Mrs. E. S. Carter of Rothesay; Mrs. Chas. G. D. Roberts, of Ottawa; Miss Georgiana Fenety of Fredericton.

The late Mrs. Fenety was a daughter of the late Rev. John Black, for years rector of Kingsclear. She is survived by two brothers and three sisters, John Black, of the Yukon; William Black of Victoria, B. C.; Mrs. M. V. Paddock of St. John; Mrs. M. C. C. Fenety of Ireland and Mrs. M. B. Dixon of Fredericton. Five children, three sons and two daughters, survive the deceased—Ernest, now in the west, who served overseas with the 10th Battalion, C. E. F.; Witter W. O. in partnership with his father in Fredericton; Jack of St. John; Mrs. Fred. P. Colter and Miss Mary Fenety of Fredericton.
