

BIG TIMBER LIMIT SALE IS ADVERTISED

UPSET PRICE WILL BE
ANNOUNCED AT SALE

Limits Located All Over the
Province—Biggest Sale in
Many Years—15-Year
Licenses.

The Royal Gazette this week contains the first part of the advertisement of the Crown Land timber Licenses which will be offered for sale at public auction Thursday, September 5th, at the Crown Land office. The advertisement contains notices of Lots No. 1 to No. 104 and Lots No. 105 to 112 will be advertised in the next issue. The limits contain about four hundred square miles some of which is located in the Training Ground Reserve in the vicinity of McGivney Junction, which was offered by the province to the Department of Militia some years ago as a training area but which never was put to that use, reverting to the province. The balance is miscellaneous areas in various parts of the province.

Under New Regulations

The licenses will be sold subject to the new timber regulations which go into effect August 1st next. The licenses expire upon the same date and will run until August 1st 1933, subject to annual renewal, fire protection tax and payment of stumpage.

Upset Prices Not Named

The upset price of the limits is not named in the advertisement but will be announced at the time of sale. The value of timber licenses has advanced to a considerable extent within the past few years. In view of that fact it is probable that the upset price named will be far in advance of any previously named. The sale will be one of the biggest which ever was held in the province.

SEVEN-TENTHS OF LICENSE HOLDERS IN ASSOCIATION

OFFICERS AND EXECUTIVE
ELECTED YESTERDAY

Executive Will Meet Here in
Early August—Permanent
Secretary will be Em-
ployed.

The organizing meeting of the New Brunswick Lumbermen's Association was finished last night the constitution and bylaws being adopted and officers elected. The members of the new organization are much gratified with the success which has attended the beginning of closer association among the lumbermen of the province and believe that the association will be productive of much benefit.

Seven Tenths Represented

In the New Brunswick Lumbermen's Association are represented about seven tenths of the timber license holders of the province. The area of Crown Lands under license is about ten thousand square miles. Of that 6,900 square miles are under license to members of the association.

Executive to Meet in August

The executive of the association will meet early in August for the purpose of considering the matter of appointing a permanent secretary who will take over the duties now being temporarily performed by R. W. McLellan of Fredericton. A remunerative salary will be paid by the association to a practical man who can fill the position satisfactorily. The secretary will be required to devote all his attention to the business of the association.

CITY HAS NO TITLE TO SITE OF PUMPING STA.

TRANSFER OF PROVINCIAL
LAND NEVER WAS MADE

Water Committee Considered
Matter—Site of Victoria
Hospital Said to be in
Same Position.

Within the past few days it has been learned that the claim of the City of Fredericton to the site upon which is situated the pumping station and the filtration plant is questioned by the province of New Brunswick and in fact that there are no records showing by what right the city ever erected the buildings upon the land in the West End which was selected as a site when the water works were established in 1882-83. In view of this fact the city has been requested by the Department of Lands and Mines to pay rental for the land.

Water Committee in Session

The water committee of the City Council has been in session in consideration of the matter which was brought to its attention by a communication from the Department of Lands and Mines. His Honor Judge Wilson who was a member of the City Council at the time of the building of the original pumping station and Charles W. Beckwith who was City Clerk at the time both were asked to confer with the committee but neither could furnish information which would show by what right the city took the site.

The Circumstances

As far as the recollection of those connected with city business at the time goes, the City Council of the day made representations to the Provincial Government then in power, of which the late Hon. J. J. Fraser was Attorney General, and was told to proceed with the erection of the pumping station upon a portion of the Government House property and the matter of a title would be disposed of later. Evidently a transfer of the land never was made the matter being overlooked and forgotten until recently.

Victoria Hospital Also

Victoria Hospital which was erected some years after the water works were installed also was built upon Government House Land within a few yards of the pumping station. At that time Government House was occupied by the lieutenant governor of the province as a residence but the eastern part of the property was not in use. It is said that the matter of title to the hospital also is in question no transfer ever having been made. It is likely that both matters will be taken up with the Provincial Government and it is probable that the difficulty can be settled.
