##### SIMPLICITY RULES.

The Keynote of All Furnishings—The

Needless Trumperies in the Home.

Simplicity is the keynote of all fur-  
nishings today. No longer is the fussy  
room tolerated. To match the spirit  
of the times the furnishings of one's  
home must be subdued in color and  
simple to the last degree.

The busy woman today has too many  
interests—too many calls upon her  
time and her strength to waste any  
energy upon needless trumperies in  
her home.

This does not mean that the home  
of today must be starkly devoid of  
all decoration. It means rather that  
such furnishings as are chosen must  
have a real purpose to serve, and that  
every needless thing must be cleared  
away.

Especially through the summer  
months is this true. The clever wo-  
man is putting away her bric-a-brac  
and covering her furniture with at-  
tractive cretonne slips.

##### KITCHEN KINKS.

When a lamp wick sticks it is too  
wide, and may be narrowed by draw-  
ing out a few threads at each side.

After cleaning brass or copper with  
salt and vinegar, rub well with olive  
oil and the metal will not show signs  
of tarnish for a long time.

When frying pancakes, use a very  
little grease for the first cake, and for  
each following cake rub the griddle  
with a piece of raw potato placed on  
the end of a fork.

Badly spotted tan shoes should be  
put on a shoe tree and scrubbed with  
soap and water.

A little thick cream added to the  
horse-radish when it is mixed will  
give it a delicious flavor.

##### MIXED SALAD.

A salad which is noted for its tempt-  
ing flavor rather than for its digesti-  
bility is made of raw cucumbers, cab-  
bage, celery and walnut meats. To  
make it, select firm, even, small cu-  
cumbers and scoop out the inside  
through a lengthwise slice taken from  
one side. Mix the pulp scooped out  
with salt and let it stand for an hour.  
Then drain it and chop it and add it  
to chopped cabbage, celery and walnut  
meats. Dress it with oil and vinegar  
and return it to the cucumber shells.
