MUCH INFANTRY ACTIVITY ALONG CANADIAN LINES

Five Raids Made on the Enemy Trenches Since Wednesday--Two Machine Guns Captured--German Raids Were Repulsed--Canadian Patrol Creates a Big Uproar Among Huns by Night Attack.

Canadian Headquarters in France, via London, Jan. 13. — The week has closed with unusual infantry activity all along the Canadian lines. Since Wednesday's raid, when one of our parties captured two enemy machine guns and other materials, there have been five raids on this front, the Canadians having entered the enemy's lines twice, while the Boche has made three attempts against our positions. Early Saturday morning after we had broken into his lines and captured two prisoners, the Hun attacked in three parties of twenty men each. Two of these parties never succeeded in reaching our wire—the third penetrated our trenches, but was driven out again immediately, leaving a badly wounded prisoner in our hands. The outstanding feature of the raid was the splendid defense put up by one of our sentry groups of three men who gave the alarm and fought the attackers until only one remained unwounded. Last night after a short, sharp artillery barrage, we raided the

enemy's lines again, but the Bosche had left his battered trenches and retired before our attack.

In No Man's Land.

Night after night our patrols have been all over No Man's Land, but the engagements have been few, the enemy retreating, as a rule, at first sight of our parties. One patrolling party of one officer and three men, creeping within five yards of a much stronger enemy group, threw all their bombs into the party and retired into an empty house and sent back for more. For ten minutes the whole line woke up to all the noise of minor engagements, the nervous enemy having opened up with artillery and trench mortars to which our artillery and Lewis guns replied. The uproar lasted for ten minutes, during which our patrol could hear the cries of the wounded.

While the line has been more active there has been no cessation in either entertainments or concerts for the men, or in the educational work being carried on at the University of Vimy Ridge.

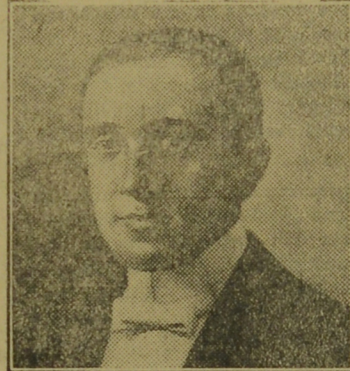
